The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter dated 8th August, 2008 received from the Regional Director, World Health Organisation, New Delhi with regard to Second Meeting of the Network of Medical Councils of the South East Asia Region, Chiang Mai, Thailand, 10-12 November, 2008 and decided to nominate the President (Acting) and Dr. D.J. Borah, Chairman, Ethics Committee as two participants from the Council to attend the meeting.

30. <u>Problems related to recognition of MBBS/BDS degrees obtained in India in the Russian Federation.</u>

Read: The D.O. letter dt. 17.04.2008 from Sh. Rajiv Sinha, Counsellor (Edn), Embassy of India, Moscow addressed to Sh. Sunil Kumar, Joint Secretary Education, HRD Ministry, Department of Education, Shastri Bhawan with copy to this Council among others together with report of the Sub-committee with regard to problems related to recognition of MBBS/BDS degrees obtained in India in the Russian Federation.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council observed that a Sub-Committee comprising of Dr.D.K. Sharma, Chairman, Registration & Equivalence Committee, Dr. C.V. Bhirmanandham, Chairman, TEQ Sub-Committee and Dr. Ved Prakash Mishra, Member, Executive Committee was constituted at its meeting held on 13/14th June, 2008 in the matter of the D.O. letter dated 17.04.2008 received from Shri Rajiv Sinha, Counsellor (Edn), Embassy of India, Moscow with reference to problems related to recognition of MBBS/BDS degrees obtained in India in the Russian Federation.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered and approved the following report of the Sub-Committee:-

The D.O. letter dated 17.04.2008 from Shri Rajiv Sinha, Counsellor (Edn), Embassy of India, Moscow addressed to Shri Sunil Kumar, Joint Secretary (Edn.), Govt. of India, Ministry of HRD, Department of Education, amongst other things states as under:-

[&]quot;

"Please refer to our earlier letter dt. 22.1.2008, 3.1.2006, 8.2.2006, 10.4.2006, 10.5.2006 and 4.11.2006 (copies enclosed for ready reference) written by the Embassy in Moscow regarding problems related to recognition of MBBS/BDS degrees obtained in India in the Russian Federation and copies of Notes Verbale dt. 31.1.2008 & 22.2.2008 (copies enclosed for ready reference) addressed to the Ministry of Education and Science of the Russian Federation renewing the invitation to the Ministry to send a delegation of experts to India to discuss technical details of an agreement on equivalence of degrees leading to an agreement on "Mutual Recognition on Equivalency of Degrees/Diplomas."

The Embassy held (April 2, 2008) a meeting with representatives from the Russian Department related to studies in Russian Medical Institutions under the Russian Ministry of Health and Social Welfare (HSW), section dealing with issues relating to studies by foreign citizens in Russian Medical Institutions, Department dealing with International Cooperation in HSW, Department of Supervision of Education & Science (ROSOBNADZOR) under the Russian Ministry of Education & Science, Department of International Cooperation, Ministry of Education & Science, I.M. Sechenov Moscow Medical Academy, and the People's Friendship University (PFU). At the meeting it was decided as under:-

- To establish working groups in respective countries comprising representatives from concerned Ministries/organizations (Health Ministry/Human Resources Ministry/MCI/DCI/AIU on the Indian side) to formulate an agenda (issues/technical points to be discussed) for a joint Indian-Russian meeting of experts on medical studies.
- Deadline for exchange of Agenda was fixed as May 30, 2008 with the Embassy to liaise between the two sides for exchanging agenda.
- The Russian side to hand over a draft agreement for consideration by the Indian side within one month. The Embassy to send the same over to the working group on receipt an agenda for a future meeting of Indian and Russian of experts on education in the two countries, including medical studies.

Judging by the tone and tenor of the meeting (April 2) it can be said that the Russian side appears quite amenable to resolving the issue of equivalence/mutual recognition of degrees at an early date.

It is requested that the matter be taken up on priority and progress be communicated to the Embassy for any follow up action.

In this connection, the Committee also noted that they had sought from the Council the Regulations on Minimum Qualifications for Teachers in Medical Institutions Regulations, 1998; Postgraduate Medical Education Regulations, 2000; Regulations on Graduate Medical Education, 1997 and Minimum Standard Requirements for the Medical College for 50/100/150 Admissions Annually Regulations, 1999, which have already been sent to them.

The core issue is that the students who are admitted to postgraduate courses in Russian Universities after completing their undergraduate courses in India face difficulties, as their Indian Degrees are not recognized as equivalent to the Russian ones. Consequently, some students have already returned to India without Post Graduate Diplomas, even though they completed their courses in Russia, as the Russian Education Ministry refused to issue equivalency certificates.

Pending negotiations on an inter-governmental agreement on the subject, the Indian Embassy is considering to work out modalities for 'temporary recognition' to help the students who have already enrolled in Post Graduate courses in Russia. The Embassy has also corresponded with MCI in regard to full details of the undergraduate courses to be presented to the Russian Education Ministry for issuing such temporary recognition. It is in this context that the Regulations were sought from the MCI which have been promptly made available.

Normally speaking, the recognition of medical qualifications granted by medical institutions in countries with which there is a 'Scheme of Reciprocity' is covered under the provisions included at Section 12 of the I.M.C. Act,1956. Likewise, recognition of medical qualifications granted by certain medical institutions whose qualifications are not included in the Ist or IInd Schedule are in terms of Section 13 of the I.M.C. Act,1956. The procedure for recognition in terms of Section 12 & 13 respectively is incorporated in sub-provisions of the said Sections. This is the normal modality pertaining to the recognition of foreign medical qualifications. We do not have Russian qualifications covered under the scheme of reciprocity vide Section 12 of the I.M.C. Act.

In view of this the Indian medical qualifications not being taken as recognized by Russia, is a natural and logical consequence.

In view of the above, the modality which has been proposed in the communication from Shri Rajiv Sinha dated 17.04.2008 to the effect that it is proposed "to establish Working Groups" in respective countries comprising representatives from concerned Ministries/organizations (Health Ministry/Human Resources Ministry/MCI/DCI/AIU on the Indian side) to formulate an agenda (issues/technical points to be discussed) for a joint Indian-Russian meeting of experts on medical studies is logical. It is also brought out that Russian side would hand over a draft agreement for consideration by the Indian side. The same would be sent by the Embassy to the 'Working Group' for further consideration in the matter.

The basic idea is in regard to constituting a 'Standing Working Group' with representatives from both the side for the purposes of evolving equivalency/recognition as would be appropriate on case to case basis. It is also brought out that the Indian side in the working group would comprise of representatives from the concerned Ministries/Organisations namely Health Ministry, HRD Ministry, MCI, DCI, AIU etc.

In this connection, the Committee also takes note of the fact that there has been a communique from the Ministry of HRD, Govt. of India, wherein it was informed that a 'Standing Working Group' has been constituted for the purposes of evolving equivalency/recognition between India and qualifications from France. The Council has also been asked to name its representative on the said standing working group. The task, which has been assigned to this working group is to evolve mutual recognition/equivalency of the various Degrees and Post Ggraduate Degree programmes in various streams including Medical and dDntal sciences. The Council has already communicated the name of its nominee on the said joint working group.

In view of above, the Committee is of the considered opinion that the modality of 'Standing Working Group' has already been put in vogue as in case of France. The present exercise that has been brought out in the communication from Shri Rajiv Sinha dated 17.04.2008 is on similar lines. Hence, in the absence of recourse to modalities incorporated under Section 12 & 13, the proposed modality in regard to constituting the standing joint working group of the two countries for this very purpose can be said to be a working modality which would facilitate sorting out of the present issue of non-recognition of medical qualifications in Russia'.

31. "Paramedical and Physiotherapy Central Council Bill – 2007"

Read: The D.O. letter dated 13.05.2008 from Dr. S.C. Goyal DGHS, Nirman Bhavan, New Delhi alongwith copy of the report of the Sub-Committee with regard to Paramedical and Physiotherapy Central Council Bill – 2007

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council observed that a Sub-Committee comprising of Dr.D.K. Sharma, Chairman, Registration & Equivalence Committee, Dr. C.V. Bhirmanandham, Chairman, TEQ Sub-Committee and Dr. Ved Prakash Mishra, Member, Executive Committee was constituted at its meeting held on 13/14th June, 2008 in the matter of the D.O. letter dated 13.05.2008 from Dr. S.C. Goyal, DGHS, Nirman Bhavan, New Delhi with regard to the proposed "Paramedical and Physiotherapy Central Councils Bill – 2007.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered and approved the following report of the Sub-Committee:-

"The present Committee came to be constituted by the Executive Committee of the Council at its meeting dated 13th & 14th June,2008 while considering the D.O. letter dated 13.05.2008 from Dr. H.C. Goyal, Additional D.G.H.S., Directorate General of Health Services, Govt. of India, in regard to the proposed "Paramedical and Physiotherapy Central Councils Bill – 2007". The Executive Committee desired that the Committee so constituted should go through the Bill and submit its report for further consideration of the Executive Committee.

The Committee at its meeting held on 05.05.2008 at 11.30 a.m. in the office of the Council perused the communication dated 13.05.2008 from Dr. H.C. Goyal addressed to the Secretary wherein amongst other things it has been brought out that Ministry of Health & F.W. has introduced "Paramedical and Physiotherapy Central Council Bill – 2007" in the Lok Sabha on 04.12.2007. The said Bill has been referred to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Health and Family Welfare for comments. Rajya Sabha secretariat has invited suggestions in this regard from various stake holders all over the country. It is catalogued therein that the said Bill

is to regulate and maintain proper & uniform standards of education for various disciplines of paramedics and maintenance of register of paramedics. The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare is said to have received several objections and suggestions in this regard and hence, it was thought appropriate by them to seek the opinion of the Medical Council of India with justification pertaining to important points which have been raised by various paramedical discipline associations.

The Committee therefore is restricting itself to furnishing its considered opinion in regard to the focused points that have been brought out in the communication referred to above. The said letter includes demands, which have been put in by Indian Association of Physiotherapy (IAP) in one group and those put in by Society of Indian Radiographers and Medical Lab Technical Staff Forum.

The Indian Association of Physiotherapy is demanding to replace the definition of physiotherapy as proposed in the Bill with the definition physiotherapy as given in Delhi or Maharashtra Councils of Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy. The focused merit in the definition which has been proposed in the Bill would be with reference to the phrase "Medically Directed". The Committee is of the considered opinion that the practice of physiotherapy has to be under medical directions and the medical directions are the ones which are coming out of the learned expertise at the disposal of the medical practitioner by virtue of he/she possessing requisite medical qualifications included in the appropriate Schedules appended to the Indian Medical Council Act,1956. The contour of the words "Medically Directed" have to be taken note of on the basis that the treatment which has been aimed is not with reference to a condition, but for the patient as a whole which contemplates holistic approach. In this context, holistic approach means the services as may be required under the directions of the medical practitioner can be incorporated as and when required. It is for this reason retention of the words 'Medically directed' in the definition as of now is advocated.

With reference to considering physiotherapy as "Physiotherapeutic System of Medicine" or a "Separate System of Medicine" like Ayurveda, Unani, Yoga, Homeopathy, Siddha, Modern system of Medicine to be included in the definition is untenable, in view of the observations given in the preceding para. The practice of physiotherapy therefore has to be under medical direction. As such, the grant of a separate system of medicine status to the same would be an antithesis to the observation in the preceding para.

Grant of equity to Physiotherapy graduates with MBBS, BDS and BAMS graduates, the Committee would like to restrict itself in regard to the MBBS graduates as the same squarely falls within its jurisdiction. By virtue of practice of physiotherapy under 'medical directions', the question of equity does not arise.

Further consideration pertains to use the prefix of word 'Dr' (Doctor) before their name for physiotherapists like medical doctors.

In this connection, the Committee would like to bring on record the decision that has been taken by the General Body of the Council. The Ethics Committee of the Council decided that the title "Doctor" may be used by the registered medical practitioners in the modern medicine, Ayurveda, Homeopathy and Unani. No other group of workers in the field of medical profession whether nursing or para-medical staff should use the title "Doctor".

The said recommendation of the Ethics Committee were adopted by the Executive Committee of the Council at its meeting held on 19.04.2003 wherein the Executive Committee further recommended that the same should be placed before the General Body of the Council for a policy decision thereon.

The General Body of the Council at its meeting held on 20.10.2003 decided that a legal opinion should be sought on the matter. Accordingly, the legal opinion was furnished by the Learned Counsel of the Council on 03.02.2004, wherein amongst other things it was brought out that the official stand of the Medical Council of India is correctly depicted by the decision taken by the Ethics Committee and approved by the General Body of the Council.

This was based on the basis of the provisions of Indian Medical Degrees Act of 1916 which clearly shows that the basic purpose of the said enactment was to ensure that certain persons are not permitted to pose to the public as possessing qualifications in medicine and surgery which they do not possess. The main focus is with reference to Section 6A of the Act wherein it has been clearly laid down that it is not permissible for any person to add to his name any title, discription, letter or abbreviation which imply that he holds degree, diploma, licence or certificate as his qualification to practice any system of medicine unless and until he actually holds such degrees, diploma or certificate.

The entire issue was with reference to a query from one Dr. Edmund M. D'Couto who was Principal/Program-Director of KMCH College of Physiotherapy, Coimbatore. In the legal opinion it was advised that the said Principal of KMCH College of Physiotherapy be informed in unambiguous and unequivocal terms that a person holding any qualification in physiotherapy is not entitled to use the title of 'Doctor' as prefix.

It is further brought out in the said legal opinion that wherever any person found to be using the title of 'Doctor' as a prefix when such a person is holding a qualification in physiotherapy but not possessing any recognized medical qualification, he would be violating the provisions of Act of 1916 and as such he would expose himself for necessary action by filing or requiring the filing of a complaint in accordance with Section 7 of the 1916 Act for violation of Sections 6 and 6A of the extent applicable.

The said legal opinion was adopted by the General Body of the Council at its meeting held on 29.03.2004 and in terms of the decision Dr. Edmund M. D'Couto was informed of the said decision by a communication from the Deputy Secretary of the Council vide a communication dated 26.07.2004.

The Committee reiterates the decision of the General Body of the Council in regard to its operational effect and therefore a person with qualifications in physiotherapy is not entitled to use the prefix of 'Doctor' under any circumstances whatsoever. The observations of the Committee pertaining to medically directed has already been included in its opening observations and therefore does not call for any separate further elaboration.

The Society of Indian Radiographers and Medical Lab Technical Staff Forum have observed that the title of the Bill be changed to "Paramedical Council of India" or "Allied Health Professional Council of India" and removal of word 'Physiotherapy' from the title of the Bill. The Committee is of the opinion that the said observation is not called for in view of creation of separate Physiotherapy Council vide retention of words 'medically directed' in the definition of the word 'Physiotherapy'. As such, the considered opinion of the Committee is that Physiotherapists formed an integral part of the larger rubric of 'paramedic'."

32. The declaration of the institutions as (Deemed to be University) under the de novo category – consideration of Central Govt., Ministry of HRD, New Delhi letter dt.13.08.2008.

Read: The D.O. Letter dt. 13.08.2008 received from the Central Govt. Ministry of HRD, New Delhi with regard to declaration of the institutions as (Deemed to be University) under the de novo category.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council perused the D.O. letter No. F.9-48/2006-U.3(A)(pt), dated 13.8.2008 which reads as under:-

"While dealing with applications for declaration of institutions to be deemed to be universities under section 3 of the UGC Act, 1956, the Central Government is required to obtain the advice of the UGC. The UGC in turn forms Experts' Committees and also consults the various Statutory Councils responsible for different sectors of higher and professional education for valuable inputs. While ordinarily, only those institutions which have long years of standing, high standards of credibility, etc. are considered for being declared as institutions "deemed-to-be-universities", and the UGC has put in place a set of regulations for the purpose, in respect of institutions imparting education and engaged in research in certain emerging areas of knowledge, the UGC makes commendations in what it calls the **de novo** category where certain exemptions from the normal requirements of years of existence, etc. are permissible.

- 2. In order to ensure that such exemptions are not misused by applicant-institutions, it is highly desirable that statutory councils offering their comments to the UGC on such proposals under the de novo category satisfy themselves that the areas of knowledge in which programmes are offered by such institutions claiming de novo status, are indeed emerging areas of knowledge.
- 3. The Hon'ble HRM has observed on some files pertaining to applications seeking the status of "deemed-to-be-university", as under:-
 - "I am constrained to observe that we are yet to evolve some mechanism by which standards or guidelines are prescribed in emerging areas of knowledge".
- 4. Further, in order to ensure that there is consistency in the treatment of proposals seeking status of "deemed-to-be-university", the Statutory Councils may identify apparently emerging areas of knowledge considered to be de novo programmes thereby justifying the applicant institutions to be considered in the de novo category. Similarly, in the interest of a consistent treatment of such applications, Statutory Councils may also prescribe certain standards so that the advice tendered by the UGC to the Central

Government is consistent with the purpose of the UGC Act which is for the co-ordination and determination of standards in universities.

5. I would, therefore,urge that the UGC and the Statutory Councils set in motion the process of identification of all emerging areas of knowledge in their respective spheres either on their own or through formation of Experts Committees for the purpose and prescribe appropriate standards, howsoever rudimentary, in such emerging areas against which advice could be tendered by the UGC to the Central Government, for declaration of the institutions as 'deemed – to – be universities' under the de novo category. With regards,

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the letter dt. 20.06.2008 received from the Registrar, University of Calicut, Kerala with regard to implementation of Environmental Studies in all UG professional course and decided to refer the matter to the Curriculum Committee-cum-Academic Cell.

34. To amend the MCI Act, 1956 to enable the registered Overseas Citizens of India to register themselves with MCI and practice in India.

Read: The D.O. letter dated 23.06.2008 received from Shri D.N. Srivastava, the Joint Secretary, Ministry of Overseas Indian Affairs, New Delhi with regard to amend the MCI Act, 1956 to enable the registered Overseas Citizens of India to register themselves with MCI and practice in India.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the D.O. letter dated 23.06.2008 received from Shri D.N. Srivastava, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Overseas Indian Affairs, New Delhi with regard to amend the MCI Act, 1956 to enable the registered Overseas Citizens of India to register themselves with MCI and practice in India and decided to take legal opinion in the matter.

35. <u>Continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by the Tamil Nadu Dr. MGR University of Health Sciences in respect of students being trained at Perundurai Medical College, Perundurai.</u>

Read: The compliance verification inspection report (13th August, 2008) for continuance of recognition of MBBS degree granted by the Tamil Nadu Dr. MGR University of Health Sciences in respect of students being trained at Perundurai Medical College, Perundurai.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council considered the compliance verification inspection report (13th August, 2008) and noted the following:-

Distribution of beds to various units is not as per MCI norms. There is no demarcation of allotments of beds to different units in all the wards. There is no provision of separate wards for allied branches in Medicine and Surgery. For example, patients of TB and Chest are admitted in the Medical ward having no separate identity. Similar is the case for ENT, Ophthalmology and orthopedics. Beds in private rooms are fully paying beds and they are not counted towards the teaching beds. Deficiency of 40 Free/Teaching beds in Medicine and Allied branches, 36 in Surgery and Allied branches and 8 beds in OBG.

Beds in private rooms are fully paying beds and they are not counted towards the teaching beds.

- 4. In wards: Clinical demonstration areas have not been provided with audio visual aids except in O&G. No pantry available attached to wards. Facilities are created only in some areas.
- 5. The total number of paramedical and nursing staff is inadequate in relation to bed strength of 500 teaching beds and all functional diagnostic departments. This needs to be corrected.

The deficiency with respect to teaching faculty as to the requirement for the existing students is as under:-

1. (a) The shortage of teaching faculty is 28.75 % (i.e. 19 out of 66) as under:-

(i) Professor 01 (Anatomy 1)

(i) Associate Professor 05 (Physiology 1, Biochemistry 1, Pharmacology – 1 &

Physiology -2)

(ii) Assistant Professor 02 (Anatomy -2)

(iii) Tutor 11 Anatomy -6, Physiology -3 & Biochemistry -2)

(b) The shortage of Residents is 10.6% (i.e. 7 out of 43) as under:-

(i) Sr. Resident 02 (ENT -1 & Ophthalmology -1)

(ii) Jr. Resident 05 (ENT – 1, Ophthalmology -1 & General Surgery -3)

In view of the above, the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to recommend to the Central Govt. not to renew the permission for admission of 2nd batch of MBBS students for the academic year 2008-09 at Index Medical College Hospital & Research Centre, Indore.

<u>Office Note</u>:- The Secretary, MCI informed that the institute has filed a Writ Petition in the Hon'ble Supreme Court bearing WP No. 313/2008. As the matter is sub-judice, the office is directed to take appropriate action on receipt of the orders of the Hon'ble Supreme Court.

42. Change of award of AMC of 365 KVA DG Set.

Read: The matter with regard to change of award of AMC of 365 KVA DG Set.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council observed that the Annual Maintenance Contract for Generator of 365 KVA was approved by the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 12.5.2008 on the recommendations of the Purchase Committee for award of contract to M/s. Thermal Power Plus. The letter for the award of the Annual Maintenance Contract was issued to M/s. Thermal Power Plus on 3.6.2008. However, in response, M/s. Thermal Power Plus requested the Council to increase the AMC charges atleast by 15% and have not signed the agreement till date.

The members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council further observed that the matter was once again placed before the Purchase Committee at its meeting held on 16.6.2008 and approved the following recommendations of the Purchase Committee to award the contract of A.M.C. to M/s. OVN Trading Engineers Pvt. Ltd. for one year @ Rs. 33,500/-+12.3% Service Tax on the Service charges as under:-

"The Purchase Committee comprising of Sh. Ashok Kr. Harit, Deputy Secretary (Admn.); Dr. Davinder Kumar, Deputy Secretary; Mrs. Madhu Handa, Assistant Secretary & Sh. A.K. Ahluwalia, Accounts Officer, met in the Council office on 16/06/2008 at 3.00 p.m. for finalizing the AMC of 365 KVA DG Set.

It has been observed by the Committee that the award of annual maintenance contract for various equipments installed in the Councils building was placed before the Executive Committee at its meeting held on 12.5.2008 and Executive Committee approved the recommendations of the Purchase Committee for the award of annual maintenance contract for various equipments. Amongst others, the AMC for Generator of 365 KVA was also approved and AMC contract was awarded to M/s Thermal Power Plus vide Council letter dated 3.6.2008 extending the AMC contract for a period up to 31.3.2009 @ Rs. 25,000/- per year (inclusive of all taxes). M/s Thermal Power Plus, in response to our said letter requested the Council to increase the AMC charges atleast by 15% i.e. from Rs. 25,000/- to Rs. 28,750/-, due to increase of price of all domestic, industrial & commercial consumable.

It has also been observed that there was some complaint in the panel box of the DG Set and M/s Thermal Power Plus was called but they were unable to rectify the defects in the panel box. On 22.6.2008 M/s Thermal Power Plus sent the Engineers of M/s Sudhir Generator and they tried their best to repair the panel box but the panel box could not repaire by them and the pump of the generator was also effected and was not working due to which there was the total breakdown of the electricity in the Council Office. They could not even regularize the direct supply of the electricity to the Council. Thereafter with the help of other engineers from outside, electricity was regularize through the new generator of 500 KVA. The engineers of M/s OVN Trading Engineers Pvt. Ltd. who supplied the generator of 365 KVA, were called and they immediately detected the defect in the generator set and the pump of the DG set was given to them for repairing and they repaired the same in the morning of 24.6.2008.

In view of above, the Committee observed that M/s Thermal Power Plus is not having the required experience in the repair of the generator set and failed to rectify the defects in the panel box as well as in the DG set due to which Council Office was without electricity for two days and the work of the Council was badly effected.

The Committee further observed that M/s OVN Trading Engineers Pvt. Ltd., supplied the generator of 365 KVA to the Council and the initial AMC was also awarded to them. They have quoted their rates for the AMC for one year @ Rs. 33,500/-+12.3% Service Tax on the Service Charges.

In view of above, the Purchase Committee recommends to cancel the AMC awarded to M/s Thermal Power Plus and fresh AMC may be awarded to M/s OVN Trading Engineers Pvt. Ltd. for one year @ Rs.33,500/- plus 12.3% Service Tax on the Service Charges, for 365 KVA DG Set installed in the Council office."

In view of above, the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council decided to approve the above recommendations of the Purchase Committee meeting held on 16.6.2008 to award the Annual Maintenance Contract to M/s OVN Trading Engineers Pvt. Ltd. for one year @ Rs.33,500/- plus 12.3% Service Tax on the Service Charges, for 365 KVA DG Set installed in the Council office.

At this point, the President (Acting) Dr. P.C. Kesvankutty Nayar instructed the Secretary and the attending staff to leave the meeting and the subsequent item nos. 43, 44 and 45 were discussed by the members of the Adhoc Committee appointed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court and of the Executive Committee of the Council in camera and the minutes of item nos. 43, 44 & 45 are kept in the custody of Dr. P.C. Kesvankutty Nayar, President (Acting).
