

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1. Introduction

1.1 About NMC

The National Medical Commission (NMC) has been constituted by an act of Parliament known as National Medical Commission Act, 2019 which came into force on 25.9.2020 by gazette notification dated 24.9.2020. The Board of Governors in supersession of Medical Council of India constituted under section 3A of the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956 stands dissolved thereafter.

An Act to provide for a medical education system that improves access to quality and affordable medical education, ensures availability of adequate and high quality medical professionals in all parts of the country; that promotes equitable and universal healthcare that encourages community health perspective and makes services of medical professionals accessible to all the citizens; that promotes national health goals; that encourages medical professionals to adopt latest medical research in their work and to contribute to research; that has an objective periodic and transparent assessment of medical institutions and facilitates maintenance of a medical register for India and enforces high ethical standards in all aspects of medical services; that is flexible to adapt to changing needs and has an effective grievance redressal mechanism and for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto.

1.3 **Objective of the Commission**

The objective of the National Medical Commission is to provide for a medical education system that improve access to quality and affordable medical education, ensure availability of adequate and high quality medical professionals in all parts of the country; that promotes equitable and universal healthcare that encourages community health perspective and makes service of medical professionals accessible to all the citizens; that promotes national health goals; that encourages medical professionals to adopt latest medical research in their work and to contribute to research; that has an objective periodic and transparent assessment of medical institutions and facilitates maintenance of a medical register for India and enforces high ethical standards in all aspects of medical services; that is flexible to adapt to changing needs and has an effective grievance redressal mechanism and for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto.



1.4 Function of the Commission

Below are the functions of the Commission:

- a) lay down policies for maintaining a high quality and high standards in medical education and make necessary regulations in this behalf;
- b) lay down policies for regulating medical institutions, medical research and medical professionals and make necessary regulations in this behalf;
- c) assess the requirements in healthcare, including human resources for health and healthcare infrastructure and develop a road map for meeting such requirements;
- d) promote, co-ordinate and frame guidelines and lay down policies by making necessary regulations for the proper functioning of the Commission, the Autonomous Boards and the State Medical Councils;
- e) ensure co-ordination among the Autonomous Boards
- f) take such measures, as may be necessary, to ensure compliance by the State Medical Councils of the guidelines framed and regulations made under this Act for their effective functioning under this Act;
- g) exercise appellate jurisdiction with respect to the decisions of the Autonomous Boards;
- h) lay down policies and codes to ensure observance of professional ethics in medical profession and to promote ethical conduct during the provision of care by medical practitioners;
- i) frame guidelines for determination of fees and all other charges in respect of fifty per cent. of seats in private medical institutions and deemed to be universities which are governed under the provisions of this Act;
- j) exercise such other powers and perform such other functions as may be prescribed.

1.5 Medical Advisory Council

The Medical Advisory Council is an advisory body constituted by the Government of India in accordance to the provisions in Para 11 to 13 of the National Medical Commission Act, 2019 consisting of a Chairperson, and one member to represent each State and each Union Territory, along with other members as specified by the act.

The functions of the Medical Advisory Council are as follows:

- > The Council shall be the primary platform through which the States and Union territories may put forth their views and concerns before the Commission and help in shaping the overall agenda, policy and action relating to medical education and training.
- > The Council shall advise the Commission on measures to determine and maintain, and to coordinate maintenance of, the minimum standards in all matters relating to medical education, training and research.
- > The Council shall advise the Commission on measures to enhance equitable access to medical education.

The Council shall meet at least twice a year at such time and place as may be decided by the chairperson shall preside at the meeting of the council and if or any reason the chairperson is unable to attend a meeting of the council, such other member as nominated by the Chairperson shall preside over the meeting, The first meeting of Medical Advisory Council (MAC) of NMC was held virtually on 18th December, 2020.



2. Activities of Various Boards

2.1 Under Graduate Medical Education Board (UGMEB)

The functions of UGMEB are:

- Determining standards of medical education at undergraduate level;
- Developing competency based dynamic curriculum at undergraduate level; developing competency based dynamic curriculum for addressing the needs of primary health services, community medicine and family medicine to ensure healthcare in such areas;
- Framing guidelines for setting up of medical institutions for imparting
- Undergraduate courses, having regard to the needs of the country and the global Norms;
- Determining the minimum requirements and standards for conducting courses and examinations for undergraduates in medical institutions, having regard to the needs of creativity at local levels, including designing of some courses by individual institutions;
- Determining standards and norms for infrastructure, faculty and quality of education in medical institutions providing undergraduate medical education; facilitating development and training of faculty members teaching undergraduate Courses;
- Facilitating research and the international student and faculty exchange programs relating to undergraduate medical education;
- Specifying norms for compulsory annual disclosures, electronically or otherwise, by medical institutions, in respect of their functions that has a bearing on the interest of all stakeholders including students, faculty, the commission and the central government and Granting recognition to a medical qualification at the undergraduate level.

- 5. Online filling of information relating to admissions made in Medical Colleges for 1st year MBBS degree (AY 2021-22) into UG Admissions Monitoring Module Students Entry System on NMC website
- 6. Usage of Khadi products in medical colleges/institutions
- 7. Phase-wise Academic Calendar and Curriculum for 2022-23 MBBS batch 8 and Recognition/Continuation of Recognition granted to 22 medical colleges
- 8. based on assessment reports furnished by Medical Assessment and Ratings Board (MARB)
- A meeting was convened with personnel of all Educational Institutions between 11-18 Nov, 2022 which was attended by 38 Directors of Medical Education, 882 Deans, MEU Convenors/ Co-Conveners of all Colleges, 164 VCs and Registrars of all affiliated colleges, 51 Convenors and Co-Convenors of all 22 RCs & 10 NCs.

(B) Faculty Development Program for UG and P.G.

The course curricula for undergraduate Education serve approximately 706 medical colleges, while 67 standalone institutes provide postgraduate Education. Furthermore, the number of National Centers (N.C.s) has been expanded from 10 to 12, and Regional Centers (R.C.s) have increased from the original 12 to a total of 23.

(C) Detail of Faculty Development Programmes

Previously, no registration fee was charged from the participants for attending the RBCW. The Revised Basic Course Workshop (RBCW)was renamed as Basic Course in Medical Education (BCME) incorporating relevant changes w.e.f. 17.04.2023 and subsequently the registration fees was introduced as decided on 22nd March 2023 and the participants attending the various faculty development program viz BCME, Curriculum Implementation Support Program-III (CISP-III) and Advanced Course in Medical Education (ACME) were charged relevant registration fee including GST.

(D) Maintenance of Standard of Medical Education Regulations (2023)

To comply with the instructions provided by the N.M.C., colleges and institutions are required to publish their information on their respective websites, following the prescribed format. Additionally, they must implement the N.I.C. Aadhaar Enabled Biometric Attendance System (AEBAS) and the Hospital Management Information System (HMIS) in their medical colleges and hospitals. Moreover, they are mandated to establish a connection for CCTV feed transmission to the Central Coordination Center (CCC) at N.M.C., as per the N.M.C.'s letters dated 01.08.2022, 12.08.2022, 20.08.2022, 27.08.2022, and 04.10.2022.

(E) Matters related to Foreign Medical Graduates in regard to students studying in Ukraine:

Mobility program offered by Ukraine has been considered in the Commission in consultation with Ministry of External Affairs wherein it was intimated that the Academic Mobility Program is a temporary relocation to other universities in difference country globally. However, the degree will be awarded by the parent Ukraine University. This public notice was issued on 06.09.22.

Further on 15.09.22 Academic Mobility refers to temporary relocation (for the period of conflict) to other Universities in Poland, Austria, Czech Republic, France, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Lithuania, Moldova, Slovakia, Spain, Uzbekistan, US, Italy, Belgium, Egypt, Belarus, Latvia, Kyrgyzstan, Greece, Rumania, Sweden, Israel, Iran, Azerbaijan, Bulgaria, Germany, Turkey, Croatia and Hungary, however, the degree will be awarded by the parent Ukrainian University.

(F) Details of FAQs/ Circulars/advisories/notices/guidelines issued:

In order to address the numerous queries FAQs were issued based on queries by Foreign Medical Students from Ukraine & China, and FAQs were issued to ease the understanding on Compulsory Rotating Medical Internship. In order to bring awareness among the stake holders on key issues several circulars were issued during the above-mentioned period mainly on the matters related to internship fee and non-payment of stipend to Interns, Faculty Development Programs Conducted by NMC. In order to make alert the Public at large, around 10 Public Notices were uploaded on NMC website during the period. Similarly in Indian Medical Guidelines to conduct Basic Course Workshop (RBCW) and guidelines for grant of NOC for Elective/observer ship by Foreign Nationals Institutes/Colleges under National Medical Commission were issued and an Advisory for Usage of Khadi products in Medical Colleges/Institution was issued during the period.

The program has been implemented pan India.

2.3 Ethics and Medical Registration Board (EMRB)

A. ETHICS SECTION

As per the National Medical Commission Act, 2019, the Ethics and Medical Registration board regulates professional conduct of Registered Medical Practitioners and promotes medical ethics in accordance with the regulations made under NMC Act.

The Ethics and Medical Registration Board ensures compliance of the code of professional and ethical conduct through the State Medical Council in a case where such State Medical Council has been conferred power to take disciplinary actions in respect of professional or ethical misconduct by medical practitioners under respective State Acts;

The Ethics and Medical Registration Board is also responsible for evolving an effective mechanism to have a regular interaction with State Medical Councils to effectively promote and regulate the conduct of medical practitioners and professionals.

Further the Ethics and Medical Registration Board exercises appellate jurisdiction with respect to the actions taken by a State Medical Council under section 30 of the NMC Act.

During the year 2022-23 in exercise of the functions, Ethics Section of Ethics & Medical Registration Board did following significant work:

- 1. Guidelines on Aesthetic surgery and Hair Transplant procedures and Advisory to stakeholders informing them about harms of getting treatment from unqualified people have been placed on the website of NMC in Septembet, 2022.
- 2. Recommendations of the committee on Stem cell use in ASD were placed on website of NMC in December, 2022.
- 3. Guidelines on Professional Responsibilities of Medical teachers and guidelines on expectations from Medical students have been finalized.
- 4. Around 66 appeals received against the decision of the State Medical councils have been disposed of during 2022-23 including appeals returned under section 30(3) of the NMC Act, 2019.

B. REGISTRATION SECTION

Maintenance of Indian Medical Register

Further, as per the provisions made under Section 31 of the NMC Act, 2019, the National Medical commission on receipt of the report of registration of a person in a State Medical Register, is required to maintain a National Register. Accordingly, as per Sub-section-31(6) of the NMC Act, 2019, all State Medical Councils are required to supply information to the National Medical Commission regarding enrolment of a person(s) on the State Register. Based on the information furnished by the State Medical Councils, from time to time, the Council maintains an Indian Medical Register (IMR) annually and as per the said register, a total 13,65,123 doctors are enrolled on the Medical Council of India/State Medical Councils register. The development of National Register is a continuous process. At present, the details of medical practitioners received so far, are being maintained in Indian Medical Register.



a) Grant of Indian Medical Register Certificate

As per provisions made under section 31(1) of NMC Act, 2019, the National Medical Commission (erstwhile Medical Council of India) issues certificate of Indian Medical Register (IMR) and based on the applications received for such certificate, during the period 1st April,2022 to 31st March, 2023, the National Medical Commission has issued 216 certificates in respect of various applicants whose name are borne on the IMR. In the process of maintenance of the IMR the following activities are also associated.

b) Registration of Additional Qualifications

As per provisions made under section 31 (1) of NMC Act, 2019, The National Register shall contain all recognized qualifications possessed by a licensed medical practitioner. However, development of National Register is still under process. Therefore, registration of additional qualification (Broad and Superspecialty) qualification, is granted in respect of the person whose name(s) is/are borne in the Indian Medical Register and who possesses recognized medical qualification(s) which is/are included in the Schedules to the IMC Act as per provisions made u/s 26 of the IMC Act, 1956. During the period, 1st Apnl,2022 to 31st March 2023, the National Medical Commission has granted registration of additional qualification(s) in respect of 1437 candidates whose names were borne in the Indian Medical Register and also possesses recognized postgraduate medical qualification(s).

c) Grant of Temporary Registration/Permission in respect of foreign National Doctors

As per the provisions contained under Section 34(1) of NMC Act, 2019, a foreign citizen who is enrolled in his country as a medical practitioner in accordance with the law regulating the registration of medical practitioners in that country may be permitted temporary registration in India tor such period and in such manner as may be specified by the regulations. During the period, 1st April 2022 to 31st March, 2028, the National Medical Commission has granted temporary registration/permission in respect of 749 medical practitioners for the said purposes.

d) Grant & Confirmation of Eligibility Certificate

As per Section 12 and 13 (4B) of the IMC Act, 1956 read with Section 61(2) of NMC Act, 2019 an Indian Citizen/Overseas Citizen of India intending to obtain any primary medical qualification from a medical institution outside the country on or after 15th March, 2002, has to obtain an eligibility certificate from the National Medical Commission (erstwhile Medical Council of India). Accordingly, during the period, 1st April, 2022 to 31st March, 2023, the National Medical Commission has granted eligibility certificate in respect of 7496 applicants who have taken admission in MBBS or equivalent medical course at various medical institutions outside the country. And confirmation of eligibility certificate in respect of 4084 applicants to the various concerned state medical councils who have obtained eligibility certificate from erstwhile Medical council of India (now National Medical commission admission) in MBBS or equivalent medical course at various medical institutions outside the country.

e) Grant of Good Standing Certificate

As per the prevailing policy, the National Medical Commission issues certificate of Good standing in respect of doctors who are enrolled on the erstwhile Medical Council of India/State Medical Councils Register and whose name are borne in the Indian Medical Register (IMR). During the period from 1st April, 2022 to 31st March, 2023, the National Medical Commission has issued 483 certificates of Good standing in respect of the doctors whose name were borne in the Indian Medical Register.



2.4 Medical Assessment and Rating Board (MARB)

- 1. In respect of Academic Year 2022-23, LOPs for establishment of 34 Govt. Medical Colleges with an intake of 3800 MBBS students and 07 Pvt. Medical Colleges with an intake of 1050 MBBS students were issued up to 05.12.2022. Thus total 4850 MBBS Seats effective from the AY 2022-23 have been added in the newly established 4L Medical Colleges in the country. Thereafter, in respect of Academic Year 2023-24, LOPs for establishment of 05 Govt. Medical Colleges with an intake of 550 MBBS students and 12 Pvt. Medical Colleges with an intake of 1700 MBBS students were issued up to 31.03.2023.
- 2. With the objective of creating MBBS seats in Government colleges in the country, the Ministry of Health & Family welfare is implementing Centrally Sponsored Scheme for upgradation of existing State Government/Central Government Medical Colleges to increase MBBS seats. For the AY 2022-23, **02 Government Medical colleges** were permitted to increase **100 MBBS seats**. Besides, 13 private Medical colleges were permitted. to increase 850 MBBS seats (taken together a total increased annual intake of 950 MBBS seats). Thereafter, in respect of Academic year 2023-24, **03 Government Medical colleges** were permitted to increase **125 MBBS seats**. Besides, 09 private Medical Colleges were permitted to increase 400 MBBS seats up to 3L.03.2023.
- 3. In case of PG courses, increase of 3100 Government Medical Colleges and Private Medical colleges permitted by way of establishing new PG course or by the way increase of PG seats during the period 01.04.2022 to 31.03.2023.



3. Academic Cell

Following are activities performed by academic cell:

- No-Objection to Academic Mobility Program for Indian Medical Students studying in Ukraine
- Phase-wise Academic Calendar and Curriculum for 2022-23 MBBS batch 8 and Recognition/Continuation of Recognition granted to 22 medical colleges
- List of colleges which was granted recognition/COR in the academic year 2022-23
- Matters related to Foreign Medical Graduates in regard to students studying in Ukraine:
- Mobility program offered by Ukraine has been considered in the Commission in consultation with Ministry of External Affairs wherein it was intimated that the Academic Mobility Program is a temporary relocation to other universities in difference country globally. However, the degree will be awarded by the parent Ukraine University. This public notice was issued on 06.09.22.
- Further on 15.09.22 Academic Mobility refers to temporary relocation (for the period of conflict) to
 other Universities in Poland, Austria, Czech Republic, France, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Lithuania,
 Moldova, Slovakia, Spain, Uzbekistan, US, Italy, Belgium, Egypt, Belarus, Latvia, Kyrgyzstan,
 Greece, Rumania, Sweden, Israel, Iran, Azerbaijan, Bulgaria, Germany, Turkey, Croatia, and
 Hungary, however, the degree will be awarded by the parent Ukrainian University.

4. Appeals against boards

I. Proactive measures and reforms by the National Medical Commission for Quality Medical Education.

- (a) Ensuring availability of required standards in Medical Colleges for UG & PG.
- (b) Periodic monitoring to renew suitability & make available this data to UG & PG Boards for recognition.
- (c) Ensuring use of modern technology for this purpose through AEBAS & HMIS.
- (d) Penalty clauses in new regulation to deter deviations.
- (e) Uniformity in evaluation by training of assessors.
- (f) Matching assessor's specialty to the subject to be evaluated.
- (g) Evaluation of application by Experts & Presidents/Members of the Board.
- (h) Making evaluations participative: The self-evaluation when revising the requests for new PG seats in over 100 instances.
- (i) Committing to the availability of resources by the college by way of sworn affidavit as well as updating similar information on the college website.
- (j) New regulations permit decision making on the basis of self-declarations, affidavit and minimal inspections.
- (k) Required software will be in place soon to allow self-evaluations and real time decision making. Use of AI based decision making is soon put in place.

Quality medical education gives a strong foundation for health care human resource and the health service thereof. The quality was all along ensured by ascertaining several inputs into medical education. These included curricular and para curricular inputs.

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II. Initiatives of National Medical Commission for bringing transparency in its functioning.

- a) Public comments are sought on various draft regulations through its website.
- b) Records have been digitized for the proper implementation of E-Office in NMC and its 4 Boards.
- c) NMC has achieved ISO 9001-2015 certification.
- d) Major IT initiatives have been taken by NMC for removing ghost faculty, for gradual removal of Assessor/human interface, imparting best education and having real time data for reforming the medical education as under:
 - Faculty attendance monitoring Aadhaar Enabled Biometric Attendance System (AEBAS) developed by NIC. (Removes duplication/Two Timing).
 - Patient load/ Clinical material load (OPD/IPD) monitoring -Hospital Management Information System (HMIS) used by attached teaching hospitals of Medical Colleges.
 - Installation of CCTV in Medical Colleges for real time video feed in Command & Control Centre of NMC.
 - Creation of virtual lecture hall for imparting education of medical subjects of MBBS/PG courses from NMC. CDN-20011/26/2023-COORDINATION-NMC 3392467/2023/Coordination-NMC 100/139 Data of First/Second appeals in National Medical Commission for year 2022-23.

5. IT

Under the guidance of Hon'ble Minister, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, the National Medical Commission is putting concerted efforts for development and maintenance of ecosystem by use of information communication technology. NMC has Digital Mission Mode Projects (DMMP) under the e-Governance programme of Government of India. Upgradation, strengthening and modernization of DMMP are being carried out, with the aim to have technological driven, evidence-based monitoring system of medical colleges across the country. The following major ICT initiatives have been taken by the Commission:

(a) Faculty attendance monitoring through use of Aadhaar Enabled Biometric Attendance System (AEBAS) developed by NIC.

- The National Medical Commission has made mandatory implementation of the Aadhaar Enabled Biometric Attendance System (AEBAS) in all the Medical Colleges (MCs).
- The AEBAS is developed by the National Informatics Centre (NIC) and working in many government institutions for very long.
- The main purpose of the NMC to implement the AEBAS in MCs is to prevent fake faculties i.e., faculties working at two or more places at the same time. Since it uses Aadhaar as primary registration identity, it eliminates the possibility of duplicate registration.
- Further attendance has been made mandatory for the faculty, Tutors, Demonstrators, senior residents. It will improve the punctuality and availability of faculty at the medical colleges.
- The AEBAS provides an accurate record of attendance and has a dashboard with management information system which not only allows senior management to monitor attendance in the organization but also helps create individual specific record of attendance of faculty as may be required.
- Till March total 668 medical colleges/ institutes have been registered, 8 army medical colleges
 are exempted due to security reasons and 2 MCs are yet to register under AEBAS and 2.9
 Lakhs users have been registered. Out of this, 69352 faculty, 8283 tutors, 2140 demonstrators
 and 24707 SRs are registered on AEBAS. Till date, 370 MCs have registered 1786 AEBAS
 machines.



(b) Patient load/ clinical material load (OPD/ IPD) monitoring through Application Programming Interface (API) integration of HMIS used by attached teaching hospitals of Medical Colleges.

- The National Medical Commission has made the implementation of Hospital Management Information System (HMIS) mandatory in all medical colleges (MCs) for patient load (OPD/ IPD) monitoring of teaching hospitals attached with MCs.
- Medical Colleges need to share API of patient registration module of HMIS with NMC.
- Further, processing of applications of renewal, recognition, continuation of recognition, establishment of new medical colleges, new course in PG, increase in UG/PG seats mandates fully functional HMIS vides NMC's letter dated 4th October, 2022 no. D-130024/07/2022/NMC/DMMP.
- Upto March, as per information received from medical colleges/ institutions, 533 have implemented and 126 MCs/ institutions are under process implementation of HMIS.
- Upto March, 259 MCs/ institutions/health facilities have been integrated in NMC dashboard.

(c) Installation of CCTV at various places in Medical Colleges and connecting real-time video feed in Command & Control Centre of NMC:

- The National Medical Commission has upgraded and strengthened the Digital Mode Mission Project
 II by additional installation of CCTV devices in critical areas in medical colleges/ institutes across
 the country.
- This would result in enhancement of digital monitoring of medical colleges/ institutes by installing 25 CCTV cameras, as it will fetch live video feed at the Command-and-Control Centre of NMC. Data feed of 30 days is being stored for any further analysis.
- Installation of all 25 cameras at the designated places will help in carrying out the virtual assessment.
- Up to March, 153 Medical colleges have installed required cameras, and their feed is under process
 of integration at command-and-control center of NMC.
- Upto March 1900 cameras are made live from 668 MCs.

(d) Creation of lecture hall for imparting virtual classes of medical subjects of MBBS/PG courses from NMC:


- NMC has developed two-way communication lecture hall for delivery of standardized live and recorded lectures by best faculty/ subject experts to medical institutions across the country.
- It will also help in bridging the gap in availability of faculty in medical colleges which don't have experienced faculty.



6. Legal Matters

The Legal Section of the Commission has a unique structure as shown below:

Consultants hired

While the Commission is authorized one Deputy Secretary Legal, one Under Secretary Legal, one Section Officer, and two Assistant Section Officers vide recruitment rules of the NMC, given the magnitude and the sensitivity of the Court cases being filed, the Commission, in the absence of availability of regular employees, has engaged /hired 07 Consultants/Legal Officers at fixed consolidated remuneration or as per DoPT Guidelines dated 09.12.2021.

Plans for the coming year

The above is being projected to solely reflect that the present strength of consultants is purely on an adhoc basis. The same, though effective, yet needs a complete overhaul. In order to arm and equip the Legal Cell to cater to future contingencies, steps are afoot to draft Regulations under Section B(7) of the NMC Act, 2019 in order to engage experts, inter-alia, in the field of law to ensure better and effective management of legal matters of the NMC

Court Case details

As per the records, 1319 fresh writ petitions/cases have been received in the Commission and 890 writ petitions/cases have been disposed of, 28 Appeals have been filed by the Commission before the various Courts during the period. A comparative table showing the no. cases received/filed against the NMC/MCI in the last three (3) years is as follows:

Thus, it may be seen that there has been a 11% (approx.) increase in litigation in the year under Report.

Total Pending Cases: 5307

As of 09.05.2023, there are approx. 5307 cases pending before the various Courts and other judicial fora on a PAN India basis.

Counsel Fee Policy

From this year onwards, the Commission has decided and issued a new Fee Policy w.r.t. fee structure for the Counsel's fee bills. It is noteworthy that the same is more or less in conformity with DOLA Fee Bill Policy.

Drafting of Regulations: 06 draft Regulations in the public domain

Section 57 of the NMC Act, 2019 empowers the Commission to make Regulations on various subjects given in the Act whereas Section 61- Transitory Provisions also makes applicable the Regulations issued by the erstwhile MCI, till the new Regulations are framed by the NMC. The following Regulations have been drafted and placed in the public domain for objections/suggestions/comments during the period:

- a) Regulations of License to Practice Medicine, 2022.
- b) National Medical Commission (Temporary Registration of the Foreign Medical Practitioners to practice modern/allopathic medicine in India) Regulation 2022.
- c) National Medical Commission Registered Medical Practitioner (Professional Conduct) Regulations, 2022.
- d) National Medical Commission National Exit Test Regulations, 2022.
- e) Graduate Medical Education Regulations, 2023.
- f) National Medical Commission (Establishment of Medical institutions, Assessment and Rating & Increase of Seats) Regulations, 2023

Experts engaged to draft Regulations

The Commission has engaged/appointed a Group of Experts for preparing draft Regulations given the magnitude of powers given to the NMC to issue Regulations, and in order to be meticulous about the same, it was decided by the Commission to hire the services of the Group of Experts, to prepare draft Regulations. The work of the Group of Experts is being monitored from time to time and till now approx. 80% of Regulations have reached at the final stages of perusal by the Group of Experts before these are submitted to the Commission.

Hiring of Counsels

As of date, the Commission has engaged one(I) Counsel at the Supreme Court and each of the High Coutts.

Action taken to hire more Counsels

Given the magnitude of cases and the complex question of law involved, it is felt by the commission that there may be a requirement of hiring more Counsels. The Commission, therefore, has worked on modalities to hire more Counsels which in turn is expected to result in more competent defense and expeditious disposal.

7. Vigilance

The Vigilance Division in the National Medical Commission (NMC) is headed by the Chief Vigilance Officer. The Chief Vigilance Officer acts as a Specialist/Advisor to the Chairman in all matters pertaining to the Vigilance Division and keeps a close liaison with the Central Vigilance Commission and Central Bureau of Investigation. The Vigilance Division of the NMC emphasizes on preventive measures and where preventive measures fail to produce the result, the punitive and detective vigilance is taken thereafter.

One of the crucial parts of the Vigilance Division is to maintain and update an Agreed List & Officers of Doubtful Integrity List (ODI). It includes names of those officers who have been found to lack integrity. This list would help the Ministry to know about the officers whose work and conduct both needs special attention and closer supervisory scrutiny.

Vigilance Awareness Week was observed in NMC on 31.10.2022. On this day, Dr. Suresh Chandra Sharma, Chairman, administered the Integrity Pledge to the staff and officers of National Medical Commission. The theme for the Vigilance Awareness Week was-"भ्रष्टाचार मुक्त भारत-विकसित भारत", "Corruption free India for a developed Nation"



8. Right to Information (RTI)

The National Medical Commission appointed the Nodal officer(s) to compile the RTI matters at various stage and forward the RTI applications to concerned Board/Section to address the RTI matters and NMC has appointed First Appellate Authority (FAA) and Central Public Information Officer (CPIO) to various Board/Section to address the RTI matters.

- b) The Division successfully conducted the 7th meeting of NMC (on 23.06.2022), 8th meeting of NMC (on 28.09.2022), 9th meeting of NMC (on 23.02.2023) and 4th meeting of MAC (on 23.06.2022) in NMC in 2022-23. From preparation of Agenda, finalization of minutes and planning for the meeting, dissemination of information of decisions to the concerned members were carried out smoothly.



- c) Draft Regulations on National Exit Test (NExT) was hosted on the website of NMC and Secretariat Assistance had been proved for compiling more than 6500 comments and to help in framing final NExT regulations.
- d) Efforts were made for the recognition of NMC as the Accrediting Agency for Medical Education in India with the World Federation for Medical Education (WFME). For the purpose of accreditation, WFME team visited NMC for inspection in July, 2022.
- e) Disposed of 3878 grievances on CPGRAMS portal in coordination with all the autonomous boards from 1st April, 2022 to 31st March, 2023.
- f) Appeals against decisions taken by various Boards are undertaken by NMC as being the 1st Appellate Authority (under section 22(3), 28 (5) and 35 (5) of NMC Act, 2019) and 2nd Appellate Authority (under section 30 (4) of NMC Act, 2019) in the cases. He further informed about the changes made in the draft regulations and requested all the Members of NMC to further give their comments/views on the draft regulations for further improvement in it.
- VI. (a) Approval of NMC of the final Audit Report of C&AG for the year 2020-21.
- (b) Approval of NMC of the Annual Accounts for the year 2021-22 to be submitted to C&AG.

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- 6.1 Sh. Pankaj Agrawal, Director, NMC presented the final Audit Report of C&AG for the year 2020-21 and the Annual Accounts for the year 2021-22 to be submitted to C&AG for the approval of NMC.
- 6.2 NMC approved both the documents for their further processing as per extant rules.

VII. To seek approval for extension of O&M contract period for the Digital Mission Mode Project (DMMP)-I till 31.10.2022 or the complete takeover of the project by NIC's team.

7.1 It was informed that earlier the O&M Contract Period was extended till 30.06.2022, however, it still needs to extended till 31.10.2022 so that the transition between DMMP and NIC takes place smoothly. NMC approved for extension of O&M contract period for the Digital Mission Mode Project (DMMP)-I till 31.10.2022 or the complete takeover of the project by NIC's team.

VIII. Presentation highlighting important works done by all the Boards in the last quarter and also their Agenda items for discussion in the NMC meeting.

- a) UGMEB
- b) MARB
- c) PGMEB
- d) EMRB
- 8.1 Chairman, NMC requested the Presidents/Members of all the Autonomous Boards to briefly inform the NMC about their activities/achievements in the last quarter.
- 8.2 Dr. Aruna V. Vanikar, President, UGMEB informed the NMC about the status of implementation of Hon'ble Supreme Court of India order dated 29.04.2022 in SLP no. 2536-37 of 2022 titled as "NMC vs Pooja Thandu Naresh and others" and the recommendations of NMC in this regard as under:
 - a. Students pursuing education in 8th/9th semester may be given an option to finish online education in their parent college and after getting certificate of course completion from the college authorities they could be allowed to take up FMGE. After passing the FMGE they be allowed to pursue their internship as per CRMI Regulations for two years, so as to overcome the deficit in Clinical and Practical skill training and to fulfill the CRMI requirement for registering to practice allopathy in India.

b. For students pursuing 1st & 2nd MBBS (admitted after January, 2020) they may be advised to take up NEET UG exams and allowed to seek admission in colleges in India as per their merit.

c. For remaining students, other than the above categories, they may be allowed to seek admission in any other foreign country medical institutions who offer similar curriculum as pursued by them in their parent institutions.

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This shall be allowed as one time relaxation as per the advice of Hon'ble Supreme Court of India due to the unexpected situation. This shall not be followed in future.

- presented President, **MARB** Gangadhar, 8.3 Dr. B.N. activities/achievements of MARB for the last quarter wherein he informed about the no. of applications received, processed and outcome delivered. He also informed about various surprise inspections carried out by MARB and punitive actions imposed on the erring medical colleges. He also informed that in some assessment cases, some colleges, who had withdrawn their applications at last moment despite the assessors having arrived for inspection at the said medical college, as a punitive action, all the UG and PG applications for that college for the current year have been excluded. All the Members, NMC lauded the efforts made by MARB in this regard. All the members were of the opinion that the erring colleges should be imposed heavy penalties for taking NMC for a ride.
- 8.4 Dr. Vijay Oza, President, PGMEB informed the NMC that the Board is the process of finalizing the PGMER, 2022 based on the inputs received from various stakeholders.
- 8.5 EMRB having already presented their case during presentation for agenda item no. IV & V, did not make any further presentation.

Further discussions:-

- ➤ With regard to a query raised by Shri. Santosh Kumar Kraleti on the unethical business practices by certain medical colleges, Chairman, NMC informed that neither NMC nor SMC can take an action on such MCs. Such events/complaints should be addressed to respective department of medical educations in the State/UT for suitable action. Further, he also enquired about the firm who is doing the internal audit of NMC and after it was informed that it is the same firm which used to work with erstwhile MCI, requested NMC to consider changing the firm.
- ➤ With regard to a query raised by Dr. Surendar Kashyap on the recommendation of NMC for Ukraine medical students for internship, Dr. Aruna V. Vanikar apprised NMC that the details have been given in the clarification w.r.t. the CRMI regulations given by UGMEB vide its FAQs dated 5.5.2022.
- ➤ With regard to a query raised by Dr. Sahajanand Prasad Singh on the autonomy of SMCs, Chairman, NMC clarified that NMC wont override the powers of SMC using NMR. Any person who wishes to practice in any particular State/UT will have to be registered in that State/UT by the SMC and the requisite fee will have to be paid to the respective SMC.
- ➤ With regard to a query raised by Dr. Raj Bahadur on the audited accounts, it was clarified that NMC does not pay any bonus to its employees and the interest income generated in 2020-21 pertains to the period of 27.09.2020 to 31.03.2021.
- > Dr. Shiv Kumar Shankar Uttare raised a point with respect to MSR, 2020 for the need for starting clinical departments in a medical college prior to

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their applying for starting of medical college. Further, with regard to query on registration of medical practitioners, Chairman, NMC informed that despite NMC giving the unique ID to a medical practitioner, the registration will be done by the respective SMCs. Even after the start of NExT exam, the situation is not going to change. Dr. Uttare further requested NMC to take a call on doctors who are experts in more than one pathy and practicing in both. With respect to the draft RMP Professional Conduct Regulations, 2022, he requested for use of "under the influence of intoxicants/alcohol" instead of only alcohol on duty. Further he mentioned that as it happens in the Civil Courts, the complainant should be allowed to withdraw his application. With regard to hearing in SMCs, he requested that instead of daily hearing, it should be within a certain time period (for example twice in a week) because the associated doctors in SMCs are working on honorary basis only and may not be available for daily hearings. All the points raised by Dr. Uttare were well received for suitable consideration.

Dr. Akoijam Joy Singh requested NMC to consider MD sports medicine for inclusion in the TEQ and PGMER regulations. He was assured that the matter will be suitably considered.

VIII. Any other issue with the permission of Chairman, NMC on of Chairman, NMC.

With no other specific points for discussion in the meeting, the meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the chair.

The 8th Meeting of the National Medical Commission (NMC) was held on 28th September, 2022 at 11:00 AM virtually under the chairmanship of Dr. Suresh Chandra Sharma, Chairman, National Medical Commission. The list of the participants is as under:-

Chairman, NMC welcomed the Members for NMC's 8th Meeting. He specifically welcomed the members who have been nominated / renominated in NMC recently. Further, he mentioned that this is going to be the last meeting for some of the Members whose tenure has ended recently. He thanked all outgoing





Members for their valuable contribution in NMC meetings and expressed his desire for their continued association and support with NMC in future also.

- 2. Chairman, NMC initiated the proceeding of the meeting with the first Agenda item i.e. the action taken report (ATR) on the decisions taken in the 7th NMC Meeting held on 23rd June, 2022. He requested Secretary, NMC to present the first Agenda.
- I. ATR ON THE DECISIONS TAKEN ON 7TH NMC MEETING HELD ON 23.06.2022.
- 1. Presentation on Revision of Minimum Standards Regulations (MSR) by Chairperson of MSR Revision Committee, President, UGMEB and Co-Chair, President, MARB.

It was informed that in the last NMC meeting President, UGMEB & Chairperson, MSR revision committee had briefed NMC about the revision of MSR. The comments/views received in this regard have been suitably incorporated in the revised draft MSR. The same will be discussed in MoHFW for its finalization.

- 2. Approval of the final draft of the three regulations of registration:
 - i) License to practice Medicine, 2022.
 - ii) Registration of Additional Qualification, 2022.
 - iii) Temporary Registration of the Foreign Medical Practitioner to Practice Medicine in India.

It was informed that during the last meeting, Dr. Vijaya Lakshmi Nag, Member, EMRB, in her presentation, with respect to the three draft regulations, informed NMC about the process being followed to finalize proposed draft regulations. She further informed about the proposed draft regulations. The said draft regulations have been legally vetted and are in the process of final notification publication.

3. Discussion on Draft RMP Conduct Regulations, 2022

It was informed that in the last NMC meeting, Dr. Yogender Malik, Member, EMRB, presented the draft RMP Conduct Regulations, 2022 and explained about the process being followed for drafting the regulations. He further informed about the proposed draft regulations. The said draft regulations have been legally vetted and the final notification will be published soon.

4. Approval of Final Audit Report of NMC by the C&AG for the year 2020-21 and of Annual Accounts of NMC for the year 2021-22 to be submitted to C&AG.





It was informed that the 2020-21 CAG report was submitted to MoHFW for laying in Parliament. The report has already been laid in RajyaSabha, however, it could not be laid in LokSabha as the house got prorogued.

For the year 2021-22, the internal audit was carried out by CAG in August 2022. However, the draft report is still awaited from CAG.

5. Extension of O&M contract period for the Digital Mission Mode Project (DMMP)-I till 31.10.2022 or the complete takeover of the project by NIC's team.

In the last meeting, NMC had approved for extension of O&M contract period for the Digital Mission Mode Project (DMMP)-I till 31.10.2022 for the complete takeover of the project by NIC's team for smooth transition. This is also a fresh Agenda item for the 8th NMC for further extension in this regard.

- 6. Presentation were made by the four boards under NMC highlighting important works done by all the Boards in the last quarter and also their Agenda items for discussion in the NMC meeting.
- II. INTIMATION REGARDING THE APPOINTMENT OF DR. J.L. MEENA AS MEMBER, MARB, NMC AND THE RESIGNATION OF DR.G. SURYANARAYANA RAJU, MEMBER, MARB & THE END OF TENURE OF 19 MEMBERS OF NMC.

Chairman, NMC introduced Dr. J.L. Meena, Member, MARB who has recently joined NMC. He also introduced six new/renominated Members of NMC. The Members of NMC welcomed all the new Members of the NMC as well as Member, MARB. Chairman, NMC further informed that due to personal reason, Dr. G. SuryanarayanaRaju, Member, MARB has submitted his papers of resignation, which are under process in MoHFW.

III. DRAFT AMENDMENTS PROPOSED IN NMC ACT, 2019.

It was informed that MoH&FW vide its letter dated 03.08.2022 sought inputs and suggestions for amendments in NMC Act, 2019. After consultation with four boards, 06 insertions/ amendments have been proposed by NMC to MoHFW vide its letter dated 15.09.2022. These draft suggestions were shared with the NMC Members and it was informed that MoHFW has been requested to constitute a committee, by including representatives of NMC, to discuss the proposed amendments in the NMC Act.





IV. ACCREDITATION OF NMC BY WFME- PROGRESS MADE.

Chairman, NMC apprised the NMC Members that a five members WFME Team had visited India in the month of July, 2022. The WFME Team visited the NMC Campus, New Delhi for the introduction meeting and understanding the assessment and accreditation (recognition) process of NMC on 18.07.2022. Thereafter, the team visited the Maulana Azad Medical College, New Delhi for site inspection along with NMC Assessment Team to monitor the NMC Assessment Process on 19th and 20th July, 2022. The team also visited the Rao Tularam Memorial Hospital to get an idea of rural and mid level medical health care services. After site inspection, the WFME recognition team had again taken a consultation meeting with NMC assessment team on 21st July, 2022 and taken a firsthand experience of MARB decision making process in NMC. The team also inspected the command and control centre in NMC to have an idea about the digital monitoring processes of NMC. Further, the WFME Recognition team submitted its draft final report to NMC. NMC has finalized its response and sent it to WFMEfor further necessary action at their end. The decision of WFME will be communicated to NMC members, as and when it is received.

V. <u>EXTENSION OF DMMP-I & II PROJECT.</u>

(a) Extension of O&M for DMMP-I for six months beyond the extended period of contract specified in MSA/SLA up to 30.04.2023

Secretary, NMC informed that the DMMP-I Project went go-live on 31.10.2017 and as per Master ServiceAgreement (MSA), the contract was valid till 31.10.2020. Further, as per MSA, the contract may be extended up to 2 years and accordingly, the contract was extended up to 31.10.2022 in the 7th Meeting of the NMC held on 23.06.2022.

The NMC has also roped-in NIC for takeover of DMMP-I from the SI and the NIC has started the process of taking over. However, it does not seem feasible to takeover of DMMP-I till 31.10.2022.

It has been decided to make a fresh tender for takeover of DMMP-I and the PMU (i.e. M/s PwC) has been asked to prepare the RFP for this. After finalization of the tender, the new agency will also require, some time for handover and takeover. The whole process may take 5 or 6 months.

The proposal in this Agenda is to extend the Digital Mission Mode Project-I (DMMP-I) with the System Integrator (SI) for further period of six months i.e. up to 30.04.2023 or till takeover of this project by NIC or/and another agency, whichever is earlier, beyond the contract scope on the same terms and conditions.



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NMC deliberated upon the issue and agreed to the proposal unanimously.

(b) Extension of O&M for DMMP-II for six months beyond 09.10.2022, up to 08.04.2023

Secretary, NMC informed that the DMMP-II Project went go-live on 09.10.2019 and as per Master Service Agreement (MSA), the contract was valid till 09.10.2022. Further, as per MSA, the contract may be extended up to 2 years. Currently many new digital initiatives are being under implementation phase which requires coordination and integration with current system and current SI is well versed with the system as they have implemented the same. The DMMP-II current SI is having legacy data and knowledge of entire DMMP-II system.

Considering the current situation wherein Nation Medical Commission is going through a major shift and no RFP to onboard of alternate vendor to maintain the system, extension is required.

The PMU (i.e. M/s KPMG) has recommended to make a fresh tender for DMMP-II. After finalization of the tender, the new agency will also require some time for handover and takeover. The whole process may take 5 or 6 months.

The proposal in this Agenda is to extend the contract of DMMP-II with the SI for further period of six months i.e. up to 08.04.2023 under provision of clause 2.6 of MSA dated 20.09.2017 or till takeover of this project by NIC or/and another agency, whichever is earlier, for DMMP-II with the re-negotiated terms & Conditions as recommended by PMC for better monitoring of Project.

NMC deliberated upon the issue and agreed to the proposal unanimously.

VI. PROGRESS MADE BY NMC IN VARIOUS IT PROJECTS.

Secretary, NMC briefed about the progress made by NMC in its various IT projects. She informed that under Aadhaar Enabled Biometric Attendance System (AEBAS) project out of the 658 medical colleges (both Govt. and Pvt.), 648 medical colleges have been registered. In 643 medical colleges they have also started registration of their faculties. A total of 2,62,329employees, including doctors & paramedics, in the medical colleges have been registered in the systemso far. She further briefed about the state wise status of AEBAS machines in all medical colleges/hospitals. A total of 703 devices have been registered as on 22.09.2022. She requested NMC members to instruct their States/UTs 21 (16 Govt. & 05 Pvt.) medical colleges, who are yet to share the data with NMC, to share it at the earliest. With respect to the status of Health Facility Identification Number (HFID) number generation, she informed that in most of the colleges it has been done. She requested the respective members to instruct their State/UTs 46 (34 Govt. & 12 Pvt.) medical



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college hospitals, who are yet to generate HFID, to get it generated at the earliest. With respect to the status of National Health Monitoring Information System (HMIS) Dash Board for NMC, she informed that the API specifications have been released and shared with all the medical colleges. Dash Board with live data for 139 health facilities of medical colleges has been made available on 21.09.2022 at the website https://nextgen.ehospital.nic.in/dashboard/nmc/. 81 new medical colleges have applied foron boarding as on 21.09.2022 to e-hospital/nextgen softwareand the work is in progress for their further configuration in e-hospital. Out of the 658 medical colleges, HMIS is being used in 482 medical colleges. She requested the remaining colleges to respond to NMC in this regard. Further, she informed that 39 colleges have already installed CCTV cameras and configured it with NMC IP pool. 181 medical colleges have installed CCTV cameras but are not technically ready to send their feedto NMC. 197 medical colleges have issued purchase orders for CCTV cameras. She requested the members to instruct the remaining colleges in ther States/UTs to take immediate action in this regard. She further informed that necessary initiative for two way communication for lectures from NMCto the medical colleges will be implemented soon.

The NMC members applauded the efforts made by Secretary, NMC and team in this regard.

VII. RECOGNITION OF PG-DEGREES OF THOSE INDIANS WHO HAVE DONE THEIR UG DEGREE IN INDIA AND ACQUIRED THEIR PG-DEGREES IN FIVE ENGLISH SPEAKING COUNTRIES, FOR TEACHING IN INDIA.

Chairman, NMC informed that at present, only those foreign qualifications of only five English speaking counties are recognized, where a student has done his basic degree as well as PG from the same country. With respect to the PG qualifications earned alone in these English speaking countries, Chairman, NMC mentioned that it will be useful for India, if services of such doctors/faculty is utilized in the country. He told that the number of years of post PG experience of such doctors in these countries be considered for teaching posts in India, provided they have a license to practice in these countries. It was also suggested that PGMEBmay constitute various Broad/Super-Specialty committees to decide upon recognition of foreign Post Graduate degrees. The NMC Members agreed to the same.

VIII PROPOSED AMENDMENT IN MINIMUM STANDARD REQUIREMENTS FOR THE MEDICAL COLLEGE REGULATIONS.

President, UGMEB informed about the proposed MSR 2020 modifications with respect to medical college intake capacity, size of the plot area of the campus, faculty requirements, need for AEBAS, HMIS, Camera surveillance, college website





etc. She further presented the academic calendar for 2022-23 batch starting from 15th October, 2022. She also informed tthatNMC has recently constituted an Anti-Ragging Cell on 15th September, 2022 under the chairpersonship of President, UGMEB. President, UGMEB informed about the first meeting held in this regard and the modifications suggested in MSR/PGMER to reduce the incidents of ragging in medical college. With respect to applications received to amend GMER 2019, she informed NMC that a decision needs to be taken with respect to number of attempts to be allowed to a candidate to pass first professional examination of MBBS. This matter was deliberated in the meeting and it was unanimously agreed upon to keep, the number of attempts to pass the first professional examination at 4 only. President, UGMEB also informed NMC that a Public Notice seeking public comments on the proposed draft for amendment in Establishment of Medical College Regulations, 1999 has been uploaded in the NMC website, wherein under clause 2(5A), under the heading 'Qualifying Criteria', the following addition are proposed:-

"The condition of 'fully functional hospital for a minimum period of 2 years' shall not apply in case of Universities or deemed to be universities within the meaning of University Grants Commission Act, 1956, having experience of establishing and running fully functional recognized medical colleges and hospital of 1000 beds or more, for at least two years, anywhere in India, provided that:-

- (i) The building of both the hospital and the medical college is owned and managed by the same organization.
- (ii) The building of the proposed medical college has not been used for any other purpose before making an application to the Medical Assessment and Rating Board (MARB) of National Medical Commission (NMC) for establishment of new medical colleges, and
- (iii) At the time of application, has as established multi-specialty hospital with at least 1000 in-patient beds and fulfilling all other norms under the regulation."

IX TO DECIDE ABOUT THE FORMULA AND COMPONENTS OF COMPENSATION PACKAGE AND OTHER PAYMENTS TO BE MADE TO EX-MCI EMPLOYEES.

Secretary, NMC briefed about this agenda item. The National Medical Commission Act, 2019, provided for repealing the Indian Medical Council Act, 1956, and dissolution of the Medical Council of India. On the dissolution of MCI, the services of the Officers and staff of MCI were terminated with immediate effect. Such officers and staff of the MCI were entitled for the compensation for their premature termination of employment, which shall not be less than 3 months pay and allowances, as prescribed as per proviso 3 of under section 60 (3).





Employees of erstwhile MCI have challenged the constitutional validity of section 60 of the NMC Act, 2019 by filing W.P. (C) No.11705 of 2019, Man Singh & ORS. Vs Union of India before the Hon'ble Court of Delhi. The Hon'ble Court of Delhi

vide order dated 14.11.2019 directed that respondent shall maintain Status Quo with regard to the services of 94 petitioners. Out of 94 petitioners, only 92 were in service at the time of dissolution of MCI while 2 were retired officials of MCI.

The Committee of experts under the Chairmanship of Ms. SeemaBahuguna, Ex-Secretary, Department of Public Enterprises selected Gujarat pattern as a suitable way of providing compensation to the employees of erstwhile MCI.

As per Gujarat pattern, the compensation consists of salary of 35 days for every completed year of service and 25 days for the balance of service left until superannuation. The compensation is subjected to a minimum of Rs.25,000/- or 25 days of salary whichever is higher. The compensation shall not exceed the sum of the salary that the employee would draw at the prevailing level for the balance of the period left before superannuation. This has been reiterated vide DPE OM; Consolidated guidelines on Voluntary Retirement Scheme (VRS)/ Voluntary Separation Scheme (VSS) dated 20.07.2018.

Accordingly, the detailed calculation (as approved by the internal NMC committee formed in this regard) in case of three erstwhile employees was placed for consideration/approval of NMC.

The agenda is submitted for seeking approval of NMC that alongwith the compensation package, gratuity and leave encashment will also be provided to the ex-employees of MCI. From the sum to be paid, recovery, NPS employer contribution and excess salary paid after the date of termination will be deducted/adjusted and the net amount to be paid will be declared to the ex-employee of MCI.

In these 3 cases (i.e. Dr. ReenaNayyar, Additional Secretary, Shri ShikharRanjan, Law Officer & Smt. Seema Gupta UDC), this amount can be paid to the employees as they are not part of Man Singh case.

On the formula accepted by NMC, net payment to be made to the rest of ex-MCI employees will be calculated and declared to them and also will be submitted in the Hon'ble High Court of Delhi.

NMC unanimously approved the above proposal.

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X PRESENTATION BY EACH BOARD, HIGHLIGHTING IMPORTANT WORKS DONE BY THE BOARD DURING THE LAST QUARTER AND AGENDA ITEMS OF THE BOARD, IF ANY.

PRESENTATION BY MARB

Dr. B.N. Gangadhar, President, MARB, in his presentation informed that during 2022-23, out of the 78 applications received for setting up of new under graduate colleges, 37 applications, involving intakeof 4350 UG students, were approved. Further, during 2022-23, 10 proposals involving increase of 675 seats in under graduate courses in existing medical colleges were approved. Similarly, during 2022-23, out of 764 applications for new PG seats, 489 applications were approved involving intakeof 1625 PG students. Further, out of 570 applications for increase in PG seats in existing medical colleges, 327 applications, involving increased intakeof 1380 PG students, were approved.

President, MARB informed that last date of application for admission in 2023-24 cycle is already over in July, 2022, however, till recently, decisions for 2022-23 admission cycle were sent including virtual hearing and appeal related decisions. Therefore, this category of applicants lost chance to apply for 2023-24 cycle and therefore, a decision needs to be taken whether deadline for registration for 2023-24 cycle for this category needs to be extended upto 15.10.2022.

In his presentation, President, MARB informed that in order to bring transparency in the decision making of the Board, a review committee for reviewing the decisions of MARB has been constituted with the following composition:-

PRESENTATION BY EMRB

Dr. Vijay Lakshmi Nag, Member, EMRB, NMC briefed about the status of different types of certificates issued by the registration section. She further informed that the three draft regulations viz. Licence to Practice Medicine 2022, Registration of

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Additional Qualifications 2022 and Temporary Registration of Foreign Medical Practitioner 2022, have been finalized with legal vetting on 28.09.2022. With respect to the progress made by the Ethics section, she informed that a total of 7 internal meetings of EMRB have taken place, where 19 Appeals have been disposed off and in 12 number of Appeals, order for grant to stay against the implementation of State Medical Council. The draft regulations viz. Registered Medical Practitioner (Professional Conduct) Regulations 2022, have been finalized and is ready for legal vetting. Further, she informed that the guidelines on Aesthetic Surgery and Hair Transplant Procedures and Advisory to Stakeholders informing them about harms of getting treatment form unqualified people have been issued, which are going to help general public as well as doctors immensely.

PRESENTATION BY PGMEB

Dr. Vijay Oza, President, PGMEB, in his presentation covered the issues relating to review of recognition of foreign qualifications in terms of Sections 25, 36, 39 and Section 40 of the NMC Act, 2019. Dr. Oza informed that a large number of applications and representations are being received from students by the PGMEB for recognition for foreign qualifications. He further informed that although qualifications granted by the medical institutions/colleges within India are continuously monitored by the NMC. However, there is no mechanism to monitor the qualifications granted by foreign institutions. Therefore, there is a need to evaluate and continuously monitor the foreign medical qualifications, which has been recognized by NMC and also which will be recognized in future. Dr. Oza further, informed that in order to achieve the above objective, the PGMEB Board in its meeting held on 28.06.2022 recommended for framing of guidelines for recognitions and review of the foreign qualifications.

In his presentation, Dr. Oza mentioned that the College of Physicians and Surgeons (CPS) is running various diploma, fellowship and certificate courses since 1916 and presently, the college is running 25 courses of qualifications of two & three years duration. He further informed that out of these 25 courses, only 10 are recognized for practice. He further informed that only the medical qualification granted by Statutory and other bodies in India which are covered in the schedule of Section 37(1) of the NMC Act, 2019 are recognized qualifications. He further pointed out that CPS, Mumbai does not follow the PGMER Regulations, 2000. CPS has also not provided the admission data of students admitted in 10 recognized courses. The PG diploma courses run by CPS are due for recognition in the year 2022. However, it has not applied for recognition of its three PG diploma courses so far. In the backdrop of above position, Dr. Oza mentioned that the PGMEB in it meeting held on 28.06.2022 decided that NMC and MARB should take measures to set right the irregularities in CPS, Mumbai and if necessary, derecognize the courses till necessary corrections are made by the CPS.





XI ANY OTHER ISSUE WITH THE PERMISSION OF CHAIRMAN, NMC.

- (a) Secretary, NMC appraised the Members that as per section 57 (power to make regulations) of the NMC Act, 2019, NMC is mandated to make regulations consistent with the Act. In this regard National Law University, Delhi has sent a proposal to NMC to help NMC in preparation of these regulations. The projected budget has been shown as Rs. 90,86,000/-. Chairman, NMC mentioned that since the Boards have already made few of the regulations on their own and got them notified, NMC will further negotiate with the National Law University, Delhi to reduce its proposed budget in this regard. NMC Members agreed to the proposal on the above lines.
- (b) Dr. Shiv Kumar Shankar Utture, Maharashtra Medical Council had raised certain queries with respect to the joint meeting of NMC held with the Central Council of Homoeopathy and the Central Council of Indian Medicineunder section 50(1) of the NMC Act, 2019. In response, the Chairman, NMC informed that although a meeting was held with the above bodies, however, it was only a introductory meeting as no formal Agenda was there to discuss. Chairman, NMC further informed that whenever next meeting will be held as per Act, full NMC will be involved in the deliberations. NMC Members noted the above position.

Meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.

Chairman, NMC welcomed the Members for NMC's 9th Meeting. He informed that 9th NMC meeting could not be held in December, 2022 as quorum was not completing and MoHFW was to notify nomination of members against several vacancies. He also informed that as MoHFW have nominated / re-nominated various members vide notification dt. 02.01.2023, the 9th NMC meeting is being convened now. He specifically welcomed the members who have been nominated / re-nominated in NMC recently.

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2. Chairman, NMC initiated the proceedings of the meeting with the first Agenda item i.e. the action taken report (ATR) on the decisions taken in the 8th NMC Meeting held on 28th September, 2022. He **asked** Sh. Pankaj Agarwal, Director (Admn.) to present the Agenda.

I. ATR ON THE DECISIONS TAKEN ON 8TH NMC MEETING HELD ON 28.09.2022: -

DRAFT AMENDMENTS PROPOSED IN NMC ACT, 2019.
 The suggestions of NMC have been forwarded to MoHFW and no further action is pending from Commission side.

ACCREDITATION OF NMC BY WFME- PROGRESS MADE.

Chairman, NMC informed the Commission that WFME have suggested NMC to review the 12 partially complied criterions out of the 40 criteria laid down by WFME. The review process by NMC is likely to be completed by March and the process for second assessment by WFME will be initiated.

EXTENSION OF DMMP-I & II PROJECT.

The Commission was informed that this point is also included as fresh agenda and accordingly this item will be taken-up separately as part of fresh agenda items.

- PROGRESS MADE BY NMC IN VARIOUS IT PROJECTS.
 The following progress has been made in various IT projects in NMC:
- (i) Till date, 658 Medical Colleges/institutes have been registered on Aadhaar Enabled Biometric Attendance System (AEBAS). 8 Army Medical Colleges are exempted due to security reasons. 2 Medical Colleges yet to register. 3.12 lakh users registered out of which 77, 378 are faculty, 9746 are tutors, 2288 demonstrators and 29190 are Senior Residents. 431 Medical Colleges have registered 2566 AEBAS machines. Apart from biometric attendance through finger print machines, permission has also been given for installing Face –recognition machines. Chairman informed the Commission that AEBAS machines, Cameras are also set-up to ensure appropriate monitoring of attendance being marked by the faculty himself/herself to counter mischief. He also informed that the AEBAS attendance has been made mandatory to check reporting of fake faculty by medical colleges and assist in assessment.
- (ii) 533 Medical Colleges have implemented patient registration module (OPD/IPD). Out of these, APIs of 382 associated teaching hospitals are linked with NMC's Hospital Management Information System (HMIS) Dashboard.
- (iii) 25 CCTV cameras are to be set-up by each Medical College at various locations and integrate their live feed with NMC's Command and Control Centre (CCC) to enable digital assessment. A total of 5020 CCTVs (Cameras) from 264 MCs are live till now in NMC Command and Control Centre (CCC). Further, in view of existing fire-wall constraints which restrict viewing of 1500 cameras only and the infrastructure is being upgraded to view almost 20,000 cameras installed at various colleges. Further it was deliberated that latest technology to be used to minimize the human interference.

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- (iv) Lecture hall created in NMC for virtual lectures to all Medical Colleges/ Institutes in the country by eminent faculty.
- 5. RECOGNITION OF PG-DEGREES OF THOSE INDIANS WHO HAVE DONE THEIR UG DEGREE IN INDIA AND ACQUIRED THEIR PG-DEGREES IN FIVE ENGLISH SPEAKING COUNTRIES, FOR TEACHING IN INDIA.

In order to give effect to the above decision, a Public Notice relating to the amendment of "Teachers Eligibility Qualifications in Medical Institutions Regulations,2022", was hosted on the web-site of NMC on 2.11.2022 for seeking public comments. At present, the draft amendment regulation is under consideration/consultation in NMC and based on consultation the same will be notified in due course

6. PROPOSED AMENDMENT IN MINIMUM STANDARD REQUIREMENTS FOR THE MEDICAL COLLEGE REGULATIONS.

The draft of the amendment in Minimum Standards Requirements (MSR) for the Medical College regulations is ready and under discussion in NMC.

7. TO DECIDE ABOUT THE FORMULA AND COMPONENTS OF COMPENSATION PACKAGE AND OTHER PAYMENTS TO BE MADE TO EX-MCI EMPLOYEES

Action as approved is in progress.

8. SELECTION OF LAW FIRM/LEGAL EXPERT TEAM FOR DRAFTING NMC REGULATIONS.

The Search-Cum-Selection Committee was in talks with the National Law University, Delhi (NLUD) for framing of the NMC regulations. However, the MoU between NMC and National Law University, Delhi (NLUD) could not be inked due to long time frame proposed by NLUD for finalization of the regulations and cost involved. Subsequently, the Search-Cum-Selection Committee have recommended that a team of legal experts, headed by Dr. O.V. Nandimath, Professor of Law, National Law School of India University, Bengaluru may be engaged to finalize the regulations of NMC.

II. FRESH AGENDA ITEMS: -

- 1. <u>APPROVAL OF NMC FOR ANNUAL REPORT AND AUDITED STATEMENTS</u> OF ACCOUNTS OF NATIONAL MEDICAL COMMISSION FOR THE PERIOD 2021-22.
- (i) NMC in its 7th meeting on 23.06.2022 has approved and adopted the Annual Statements of Accounts of NMC for the period of 2021-22. The office of the C&AG has now furnished the requisite Audit Certificate together with SAR in respect these accounts. The Commission now needs to adopt the Audit Certificate and Separate Audit Report along with the audited Annual Accounts of NMC for the year 2021-22.
- (ii) NMC deliberated upon the issue and adopted the Annual Report, Audit Certificate and Separate Audit Report along with the audited Annual Accounts of NMC for the year 2021-22

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- 2. EXTENSION OF O&Ms FOR DMMP-I AND DMMP-II FOR FURTHER SIX MONTHS BEYOND THE EXTENDED PERIOD OF CONTRACT i.e. 30.04.2023 (UP TO 30.10.2023) AND 08.04.2023 (UP TO 08.10.2023) RESPECTIVELY.
- (i) During the 8th NMC meeting, extension of contract for O& M of DMMP I and II with the existing System Integrator (SI) for a further period of 6 months each till 30.4.2023 and 8.4.2023 respectively has been obtained. Since the period of extension is ending shortly, further extension of contract for O & M of DMMP I and II is required and the position is as under-

(A) DMMP - I:

- (a) The NMC has roped-in NIC for takeover of DMMP-I from the SI and the NIC has started the process of taking over. Since not much progress has been made by the NIC, the manpower so hired by NMC for the project is being utilized to implement recent IT initiatives of NMC viz. implementation of the NIC's Aadhaar Enabled Biometric Attendance System (AEBAS), Hospital Management System (HMIS) in all medical colleges and connecting CCTV feed to the Command and Control Center at NMC. Hence it is felt that, NIC will take more time for takeover activity.
- (b) It has also been decided to make a fresh tender for takeover of DMMP-I and the PMU (i.e. M/s PwC) has been asked to prepare the RFP for this. However, the PMU could not prepare the RFP as they were engaged in finalization of monetization of DMMP-I payments and implementation of recent IT initiatives of NMC.
- (c) Further, as not much progress has since been made by NIC, NMC is also planning to approach Central PSU working in the field of IT for up gradation and management of DMPP-I. The detailed proposal is being sought from the PSU.
- (d) In the backdrop of above position, more time is required for takeover of DMMP-1.
- (e) Accordingly, the proposal relating to extension of the contract with the present System Integrator (SI) for continuing the O&M of the Digital Mission Mode Project-I (DMMP-I) for a further period of 6 months i.e. up to 30.10.2023 or till takeover of this project by NIC or/and another agency, whichever is earlier, beyond the contract scope on the same terms and conditions was placed before the NMC for consideration and approval.
- (f) NMC deliberated upon the issue and agreed to the proposal unanimously.

(B) <u>DMMP - II</u>:

(a) DMMP-II Project went go-live on 09.10.2019 and the contract was valid till 09.10.2022. Further, as per MSA, the contract may be extended up to 2 years. During the 8th Meeting of the NMC held on 28.09.2022, approval for extension of contract for O & M of DMMP – II with the existing System Integrator (SI) for a further period of 6 months till 8.4.2023 has been obtained.

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- (b) PMU team were mainly concentrated on project management of implementation recent IT initiatives of integration of 25 CCTV cameras to CCC of NMC and current SI because of their knowhow of the existing system were tasked to integrate camera feed received from the colleges by engaging separate additional manpower as recommended by PMU team.
- (c) The PMU (i.e. M/s KPMG) has recommended for making a fresh tender for DMMP-II. The PMU have also prepared project schedule for DMMP II 2.0 with estimated time lines for preparation and finalization of RFP, release of tender, evaluation of bids and finalization of Vendor / new SI etc. After finalization of the tender and roping-in of a new SI, the new agency / SI will also require some time for handover and takeover. The whole process may take 5-6 months.
- (d) In view of the same, proposal is placed before the NMC for extending the contract with the present System Integrator (SI) for continuing the O&M of the Digital Mission Mode Project-2 (DMMP-2) for a further period of 6 months i.e. up to 8.10.2023 under provision of clause 2.6 of MSA dated 20.09.2017 or till takeover of this project by NIC or/and another agency, whichever is earlier, for DMMP-II.
- (e) NMC deliberated upon the issue and agreed to the proposal unanimously.
- 3. Presentation by EMRB: -
- (i) Dr. Yogender Malik, Member, EMRB, NMC made a presentation to the Commission briefing about the status of different types of certificates issued by the Registration Section. He further informed that the final drafts of the regulations viz. Licence to Practice Medicine-2022, Registration of Additional Qualifications- 2022 and Temporary Registration of the Foreign Medical Practitioner 2022 have been finalized with vetting from legal advisors on 28.09.2022 and the final drafts have been sent to Ministry of Health & Family Welfare on 25.10.2022.

(ii) ISSUE OF ELIGIBILITY CERTIFICATES FOR MBBS (FMGs) BETWEEN 2010-2019.

Dr. Yogender Malik, Member, EMRB with regard to the issue of Eligibility Certificates for MBBS (FMGs) between 2010-2019 informed the Commission that a meeting under the Chairmanship of Chairman, NMC was held on 08.02.2023 attended by Presidents of UGMEB, PGMEB and MARB and Members of EMRB wherein it was decided that the past exercise of grant of Eligibility Certificate to candidates who have proceeded to Foreign Country without obtaining/applying for Eligibility Certificate with erstwhile MCI (now NMC) is to be continued till two years from today (08.02.2023). Further, with regard to those applicants who had not taken their eligibility certificate before going abroad and still not completed their deficiencies even after several chances have been given to them through online mode, it has been decided in the Meeting that a list of such students may be uploaded on the NMC website along with a public notice informing them that they may submit their applications after rectifying the deficiencies within 30 days of public notice failing which the application will stand rejected / treated as closed.

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It was further proposed that there should not be any upper age limit for issuance of Eligibility Certificate. Hence, applications for issuance of Eligibility Certificate of Upper Age Limit can be processed accordingly NMC agreed to the above proposal unanimously.

(iii) PROGRESS MADE BY THE ETHICS SECTION: -

Dr. Yogender Malik, Member, EMRB informed that the final draft of regulations 'Registered Medical Practitioner (Professional Conduct) Regulations 2022', has been sent to Ministry of Health & Family Welfare on 03.11.2022. Further, he informed that for creation of panel of experts related to different fields of specialties, details of eligible and willing teachers were sought from Government Medical Colleges as well as INIs.

(iv) GOOD PRACTICE GUIDELINES FOR RMPs: -

Dr. Yogender Malik, Member, EMRB, NMC also informed that EMRB intends to release Good Practice Guidelines periodically based on appeal cases decided by Ethics and Medical Registration Board which can act as a guide for medical teachers/practitioners to generate awareness on various aspects related to medical ethics and good conduct. Dr. Yogender Malik further informed that the first issue of the guidelines is almost ready and if approved by NMC will be published soon by EMRB.

NMC deliberated upon the issue and approved the proposal.

(v) <u>PROFESSIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES & ETHICAL GUIDELINES FOR MEDICAL</u> TEACHERS.

Dr. Yogender Malik, Member, EMRB, NMC informed that EMRB has prepared these guidelines and these were sent to NMC members for comments. They have been finalized and ready for publication.

Chairman, NMC informed the Commission that keeping in mind the influence a good teacher can have on the life of medical students and values he/she can teach them, these guidelines have been formulated for teachers by Ethics and Medical Registration Board in consultation with eminent experts from diverse fields.

(vi) RESPONSIBILITIES & ETHICAL GUIDELINES FOR MEDICAL STUDENTS.

Dr. Yogender Malik, Member, EMRB, NMC informed that EMRB has prepared these guidelines and these were sent to NMC members for comments. They have been finalized and ready for publication.

Chairman, NMC also informed the Commission that with the goal of developing desired qualities in a medical student keeping in mind the rich heritage of goal oriented medical education in India since ancient times and the expectations from a doctor of today, it was deemed important to lay down benchmarks of responsibilities of a medical student. So, Ethics and Medical Registration Board in consultation with various experts framed guidelines for medical students.

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Chairman, NMC also informed that such guidelines will continue to be developed in future and disseminated to the medical fraternity including medical students and teachers etc. and for this purpose a publication division will be established and Dr. Yogender Malik, Member, EMRB, NMC will head the same.

NMC approved publication of both the above guidelines.

- 4. Presentation by President UGMEB: -
- (i) Dr. Aruna V. Vanikar, President, UGMEB, NMC made a presentation to the Commission briefing about the various activities undertaken by UGMEB in 2022 (Last Quarter) 2023. She informed the Commission that UGMEB interacts with all stakeholders every year 2 to 3 times and during 11-18 November, 2022, UGMEB held meetings with Directors of Medical Education from 38 States / UTs, Deans /MEUs of Medical Colleges (882 Attendees), 164 Vice-Chancellors / Registrars of all concerned Universities, 51 Conveners / Co-conveners of 22 Regional Centers and 10 Nodal Centers totaling almost 1000 attendees wherein the following issues were discussed: -

Appointment of examiners, Academic calendar for 2022-23 batch, Anti-ragging Cell, Identification of Best teachers from colleges, and Education in bilingual languages.

- (ii) The position regarding various pending court cases and verdicts pronounced by Hon'ble Supreme Court of India has been intimated to the Commission, as under –
- (a) Hon'ble Supreme Court of India up held both the FMGE and CRMI regulations.
- (b) The ibid matter relating National MSC Med. Teachers' Association VS, NMC is subjudice.
- (c) Hon'ble S.C.I- FMGE Internship: In pursuance of Hon'ble SC order, the foreign medical students who following completion of Under Graduate Medical Education in their parent organization and passing FMGE, the candidates have to do 2 yrs CRMI as per CRMI regulations. Further, a onetime relaxation has been given as per the directions of Ministry of Health & Family Welfare to the extent that CRMI done / started by the foreign medical graduates in approved colleges / hospitals / institutes according to old MCI list on or before 21.10.2022 shall be considered valid.
- (d) Hon'ble S.C.I.- The regulation under GMER stipulating that first year MBBS is to be completed in 4 Attempts has been upheld by Hon'ble Supreme Court of India.
- (iii) Electives Proposed notification for foreign students:-

In order to regulate the elective training to foreign nationals in India, a committee has been constituted by NMC which examined the issues at length and following guidelines are proposed to be introduced and the Commission is requested to approve the same-

(a) No Foreign National shall be allowed to join any Indian Medical Institute/ University in any capacity without the consent of National medical Commission.

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- (b) Number of Foreign Nationals for elective training shall Not exceed 5% of sanctioned annual intake of that medical colleges.
- (c) The maximum period of elective training shall be 90 days only.
- (d) Processing fee to grant permission to Foreign Nationals for elective training: USD 100.

NMC approved the proposal.

(iv) Mandatory Requirements for recognition / continuation of recognition of medical colleges:-

Following guidelines have been issued to all medical colleges making implementation of the same as mandatory for recognition / continuation of recognition of medical colleges:-

- (a) To display the information of college/institution on their website linked to NMC in proforma prescribed by MARB vide circular dated 13.12.2021.
- (b) Implementation of NIC Aadhaar Enabled Biometric Attendance System (AEBAS), Hospital Management Information System (HMIS) of Medical Colleges, hospitals and to connect CCTV feed to Command Control Centre (CCC) at NMC in compliance to NMC's letters dtd 01.08.2022, 12.08.2022, 20.08.2022, 27.08.2022 & 04.10.2022

NMC is now considering the above information / data of the medical colleges along with the information / data provided in the Inspection Report of the Assessors for deciding on recognition / continuation of recognition of the medical colleges.

(v) Recognition / Continuation of Recognition (COR) Status:-

A total of 99 applications for Recognition / COR for the AY 2023-24 have been received from medical colleges of which 23 have been recognized. Out of the 23, 7 are government medical colleges for 1000 seats and 16 are private medical colleges for 2420 seats.

(vi) Academic Cell: -

The academic cell was being handled by Prof. (Dr.) Rajlakshmi and since she has now been relieved of her charge, on 31/12/22, a committee was constituted under the chairmanship of Dr. Aruna V. Vanikar, President, UGMEB and Dr. Vijayendra Kumar, Member, UGMEB as Co-Chair with experts from various Institutions.

(vii) <u>SUMMARY OF FINANCIAL ASPECTS IN CONDUCT OF FACULTY</u> DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME: -

On receipt of 30% of ACME, 50% BCME & 50% of CISP -III fee collected at NMC, the Programme becomes self-sustainable and the same can be continued by NMC for improving the medical education in the country. Hence the Commission approves the same.

5. Presentation by President MARB:-

(i) Dr. B.N. Gangadhar, President, MARB informed the Commission that for the academic year 2023-24, MARB has sought applications from various medical colleges for various UG / PG courses and they have received 160 applications for UG courses of which 85 are from new medical colleges and 1200 applications have been received for various broad specialty PG courses. By the end of last academic year, UG seats have increased close to 1 Lakh and with the addition of about 3000 UG seats as of now, the total UG seats in the country reached approx. to 1,02,000 and with the additional 2000 PG seats the number of broad speciality PG seats have crossed 50000 mark. He further informed that NMC would minimize the physical inspections as medical colleges have been asked to provide their annual declarations and based on their declarations, affidavit and the information available with NMC, decisions on their applications would be taken.

(ii) Legal issues in MARB: Challenges / Writs:-

President, MARB briefed the Commission about various court orders / judgements relating to MARB. A total of 14 court orders have come of which 10 are in favour of MARB and 4 in favour of the colleges. 10 cases are pending.

(iii) Regulations of NMC:-

President, MARB also briefed the Commission about the status of various regulations being drafted by NMC and its Boards. He informed that a team of experts led by Prof. Nandimath of National Law School, Bangalore has been engaged for providing assistance in legal drafting of the regulations relating the MARB, UGMEB, PGMEB, Ethics & Registration and Administrative regulations of NMC with technical inputs being provided by the concerned Boards. The draft regulations relating to Ethics as well as PGMEB have already been placed in public domain and over 5000 comments / replies have come from the public and the final draft in legal style has also been prepared and would be placed in public domain shortly. The regulations relating NExT examination has been placed in public domain and the comments / suggestions received from public are being compiled /evaluated and would be finalized at the earliest. The UGMEB regulations including MSR have been revised. MSR will include PG standards and soon draft regulations of MSR, UGMEB & MARB will be shared with the members of the Commission.

Progress of PGMEB:-

Chairman, NMC informed the Commission reg. the progress of PGMEB. He stated that as all members are already aware, PGMEB Board have already notified TEQ

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Regulations which was notified during February, 2022. PGMEB is presently working on PG Regulations and also on guidelines for Stand-alone PG Institutes.

(ii) President, PGMEB while attending the meeting on-line, informed the Commission that presently the PG Board is occupied with applications received from various medical colleges for recognition of various courses / qualifications. He informed that they have a total of 77 PG courses / specialties out of which 38 are broad specialties i.e. MD/MS and 39 are super specialties. Due to Covid, during last 2 years the inspection and recognition processes have got disturbed which resulted in accumulation of work and this time MARB was requested to do inspection of 2309 courses / qualifications and MARB have taken up the same earnestly and till now PGMEB have received 889 SAF forms post inspections from MARB out of which PGMEB have completed /processed 600 forms and sent letters to 400 medical colleges and about 200 forms are under process and the process of Recognition / Continuation of Recognition (CoR) and Recognition for increased number of seats would be completed at the earliest.

III ANY OTHER ISSUE WITH THE PERMISSION OF CHAIRMAN, NMC.

- Chairman, NMC opened the floor for suggestions and requested members to convey their approval / disapproval, if any, with the proposals / updated position submitted against all the agenda items during the meeting and also offer their suggestions for improvement of the functioning of NMC.
- (a) All members present have conveyed their approval to the agenda items / updates/ progress submitted during the meeting.
- (b) Dr. Rajiv Bahl, Secretary, DoHR & DG, ICMR complemented NMC for its encouragement to Research in Medical Colleges and suggested for encouraging MD/PHD programme in various medical colleges and also for providing job opportunities. Chairman, NMC welcomed the suggestion and informed that as per the regulations preference shall be given to MS/MD with PhD and relevant teaching experience over MS/MD with teaching experience.
- (c) Dr. Rajendra A Badwe, Director, TMH, Mumbai praised idea of inclusion of "equanimity in clinical arena" in good practice guidelines as well as in responsibilities & ethical guidelines for medical teachers and medical students and any form of misbehavior / outburst by a medical professional with his patient, with his senior / junior colleague, student is not tolerated. Chairman, NMC welcomed the suggestion.
- (d) Prof. (Dr.) Saket Kushwaha, VC, RGU, Arunachal Pradesh suggested for introduction of Aadhaar or Mobile verification while receiving various online applications etc. by NMC in order to eliminate proxy applications / involvement of touts. Chairman, NMC, asked Dr. Yogender Malik, Member, EMRB to consider the above suggestion.
- (e) Prof. (Dr.) Gurmeet Singh, VC, Puducherry University suggested for having a suitable mechanism to monitor the functioning of the cameras being established at various locations in the medical colleges so that these are not disabled / non-functional and for issuing uniform guidelines for installing them at various locations in the Colleges. He also

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suggested for involvement of an expert from best universities by NMC while framing guidelines for PhD programme so that the guidelines can be streamlined in terms of admission and acquiring of doctor degree. Chairman, NMC informed that the suggestion would be considered while framing guidelines for MD/PhD programme.

- (f) Lt. Genl. (Dr.) Rajan Singh Grewal, VC, Sikkim Manipal University suggested for taking in to view the vast geographical spread of the country and the variations in academic levels amongst the medical colleges while setting the standards and conducting the NExT Examination. Chairman, NMC has informed that NMC is fully aware of these issues and sympathetic to the concerns of the medical students and in order to reduce the stress and remove the apprehensions in the minds of the students, NMC is in the process of conducting a mock run of NExT Examination which will help them in understanding the pattern of the examination. NMC would get on Board all universities and the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare in conducting the NExT Examination as theory component of the examination will be conducted by NMC and the practical component of the examination is to be conducted by various universities and the purpose of the NExT Examination is to improve the education standard and make it uniform.
- (g) Dr. M.K. Ramesh, VC, Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences, Karnataka highlighted the issue of difficulties being faced by medical colleges / universities in finding external examiners as inspite of written requests for examiner-ship, their colleges are refusing to relieve them. Chairman, NMC stated that NMC discourages any authority / college to prevent any professor / faculty from going for examiner-ship and such professor / faculty will continue to be counted by NMC as part of faculty strength during assessment.
- (h) (i) Dr. Mohanan Kunnummal, VC, Kerala University of Health Sciences, Thrissur, Kerala sought for clarification whether extra attendance can be given /counted in respect of those students whose attendance was short at the time of 1year MBBS main examination to make up for the shortfall in attendance and allow the students to appear for supplementary examination. Chairman, NMC clarified that as no classes are held after the first year examinations and the supplementary examinations, the attendance cannot be counted. However, in case, extra / additional classes are held for 1st year and are documented the same would be countable. Dr. Mohanan Kunnummal sought for clarifications on this issue i.r.o. 2nd year supplementary examination and final year Part 1 / Part II examinations. Chairman, NMC informed that President, UGMEB would arrange to upload necessary clarifications on this issue on the website under Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) Section.
- (ii) Dr. Mohanan Kunnummal highlighted the Student Support Guidance Programme introduced by their university to help the new students and to guide them how to avoid depression in them as at-least 10% of the students develop depression. Chairman, NMC appreciated the measures taken by KUHS which need to be replicated by various universities / medical colleges across the country. He informed that NMC / UGMEB would arrange for delivering a lecture by Dr. Mohanan Kunnummal on this Programme from NMC.

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- (i) Dr. Buchipudi Sambasiva Reddy, Andhra Pradesh Medical Council has raised the issue of CME guidelines and counting of credit points for the CMEs completed for reregistration and asked as to by when NMC would notify its guidelines. Chairman, NMC informed that EMRB has finalised the draft already and sent to ministry for legal vetting and these will be issued shortly.
- (j) (i) Dr. Karunakar Reddy, VC, Kaloji Narayana Rao University of Health Sciences, Telangana desired to know whether NMC can allocate additional seats for MD+PhD programme so that research in clinical subjects get encouragement and also sought for issuing of guidelines by NMC making examinership mandatory and absence of faculty for undertaking examinership duty should be counted as faculty strength during assessment by MARB, NMC, as it is becoming difficult for universities and medical colleges to get faculty to take up examinership. Chairman, NMC suggested that these issues may be taken-up in writing with NMC so that these issues can be considered and appropriate guidelines can be issued by NMC.
- (ii) Dr. Reddy also sought clarification with regard to payment of stipend for 2-year period for FMGs doing internship. Chairman, NMC clarified that one-year internship is to make-up for the clinical training missed by these FMGs and hence no stipend is to be paid. However, for the second year internship stipend is to be paid to them for the clinical service rendered by them.

Meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.



1. CLASSIFICATIONS OF EXPENDITURE & REVENUE RECOGNITION

The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and on accrual basis. All income expenses, assets and liabilities are accounted for on accrual basis under the natural head of accounts.

2. FIXED ASSETS AND DEPRECIATION

Fixed Assets are valued at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation of fixed assets for the year has been provided on the written down value of assets at the following rates.

Lease hold land is amortized over the period of lease.

Above rate of depreciation has been adopted from the income tax rule as provided in appendix 1 of rule 5 of Income Tax Rule, 1962. In respect of additions to fixed assets during the year depreciation is provided @50% as applicable in case of where assets are used for less than 180 days in the financial year. Fixed Assets represent assets created out of earmarked fund and NMC- Own Receipts a/c.

3. ACCOUNTING TREATMENT IN RESPECT OF FIXED ASSETS ACQUIRED OUT OF GRANT-IN-AID/EARMARKED FUNDS

Fixed assets acquired out of grant/Earmarked funds have been treated as deferred Income and same has been recognized in Income & Expenditure A/c on systematic and rational basis over the useful life of such assets: i.e. such grant are allocated to income over the periods and in the proportion in which depreciation is charged.



4. INVESTMENT

The Commission has not made any investment other than the amount deposited in Fixed Term Deposit with Banks.

5. CORPUS/CAPITAL FUND

This represents the accumulated balance of Excess of Income over Expenditure and net value of Fixed Assets acquired from Grant-In-Aid and net value of fixed assets transferred from earmarked fund and net value of Fixed Assets acquired from Commission's Own Resources.

6. RETIREMNET BENEFITS/STAFF PENSION FUND

The Commission has established a Staff Pension Fund A/c with Nationalized Bank towards meeting a Pensionary Liabilities for which contribution has been made during the year.

7. GENERAL PROVIDENT FUND

The Commission has established a general provident fund account with the Nationalized bank under the sub section (2) of section 8 of General Provident Rules 1925 (XIX of 1925) with the permission of Central govt. vide Gazette notification No. F.43-6/37/-H dated 03/06/1937 Govt. Of India, Dept. Education, Health & Lands, Shimla of Provident Fund Rules.

All subscriptions received from employees are deposited into the GPF A/c.

The difference, if any between the interest earned on deposit and the interest paid to the GPF subscribers, is paid by the Commission/GP Fund.

8. CONTINGENT LIABILITY

The Commission has no contingent liability on the Balance Sheet date.

9. CHANGE OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND MATERIAL EFFECT

During the current year accounts of the Commission has been prepared in uniform format of Accounts which is applicable to all Central Autonomous Bodies. Since the new format does not provide place for C.P.F./G.P.F. and Pension Fund A/c, therefore, same have been annexed to this Financial Statement (may be seen at Annexure –II & III) However, the Balance Sheets of GPF A/c & Pension Fund A/c have also been incorporated in the Balance Sheet of the Commission.

- 10. While preparing the financial statement, the principle of accrual system of accounting, concept of going concern, matching concept and consistency have been maintained.
- 11. The current assets includes postage stamp in hand, cash and bank balances, accrued interest, pre-paid expenses and which have value on realization in the ordinary course of business equal at least to the aggregate amount shown in the Balance Sheet.



12. Previous year figures of Grant in aid A/c & Own Resources A/c have been regrouped wherever necessary. Figures have been rounded off to nearest rupees.





Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of National Medical Commission for the year ended 31 March 2023

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of National Medical Commission (Commission) as at 31 March 2023, the Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payment Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19 (2) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. These financial statements are the responsibility of the management of NMC. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cumperformance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.
- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
- i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
- ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payment Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the uniform format of accounts approved by the Ministry of Finance, Government of India;
- iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Commission in so far as it appears from our examination of such books;
- iv. We further report that:

A. General

- A.1 Bank Guarantees worth ₹ 3552.85 crore were lying with Commission. This fact has not been disclosed in Notes on Accounts. This need to be shown in Schedule of Notes to Accounts.
- A.2 The provision for retirement benefit was not made as per Actuarial valuation as prescribed in AS 15. This was also pointed out in previous SAR but no action was taken.

A.3 Mismatch of balance in Pension Fund in Trial Balance and Annual accounts

Commission uses software to prepare trial balance and it is used for making the Annual Accounts. During the examination of trial balance of Pension fund and Provident fund, audit noticed some mismatch in figures. The details are given below:

B. Grants-in-Aid

During the year 2022-23, the Commission did not receive any Grant-in-Aid from Ministry of Health & Family Welfare. - d) Management's response to internal and external audit objections was not effective as 42 paras were outstanding as on 31.03.2022.
- e) Investment Register has not been maintained as per proper fomat.
- f) Assets register has not been maintained as per proper fomat.

3. System of physical verification of Assets

Physical verification of fixed assets was conducted up to 31 March 2019.

4. System of physical verification of inventory

The physical verification of books, publication, stationery and consumables up to 31.03.21.

5. Regularity in payments of statutory dues

As per accounts, no statutory dues were pending on Commission.
